Hi Anthony,

I hope you are doing well and enjoyed the summer!

I'm reaching out because we are exploring alternate sites for the Emergency Weather Response whic we currently operate at the Star of the Sea. We may have an opportunity to open a temporary site which can remain open for every night of the cold season as opposed to just during extreme colds.

Last year, we were open for over 90 nights with a number of very brief closures in between the nights. I am hoping that the City would consider allowing the EWR to operate out of a City facility this year. EWR is generally open between the hours of 10 pm and 7 a.m. We are accustomed to using spaces which are used during the day. A good example of this would be the shelters in Vancouver which 'pop up' in community centres, etc.

If you have some time, I would appreciate the opportunity to chat more about this. Let me know what works.

I wanted to update you on how White Rock is working towards affordable housing opportunities.

During last night's Governance & Legislation Committee session, I raised the need for council to address creating below-market housing for our seniors who may be displaced by development. Ideally this will be done through public-private partnerships, as we've previously discussed, with the city potentially owning the land and a non-profit building and operating the units. I requested staff report back at our next G&LC meeting how much money the city has available for purchasing land to realise this goal.

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Hello,

I just spoke with the officer who attended. The conversation with the complainant did not go exactly as outlined in the Facebook post.

The conversation was centered around crime prevention and what the complainant could do to make their vehicle less attractive to thieves, such as locking their doors and ensuring valuables aren't left in the vehicle. The complainant then questioned the member about homelessness in the city and the member did say that we do see a slight increase in the amount of homeless who do make their way into the city in the winter months, due to the shelter and soup kitchen, and that it does bring some homeless from other jurisdictions. This is true based on various members conversations last year with persons who were attending the cold weather shelter from North Surrey, Langley, Ridge Meadows, Vancouver, etc. all of whom advised that they had made their way into White Rock because of the level of service provided at the cold weather shelter, the soup kitchen, and the safety of White Rock compared to other jurisdictions they had been. All of my members are aware of who the local homeless are, and so when new people show up in town they make it a priority to get to know them. That is what I expect of them, its simply good policing.

At no time was there any mention of a "huge" influx of homeless, nor was there any mention by my member of homelessness being directly linked to crime. I believe that this was likely an inference made on the part of the complainant.

I'd say that the conversation, as laid out in the post, has definitely been misrepresented after speaking with the member. That said, I often remind my members to be careful in how they present things and what they say to the public, as they often do get spun, and misrepresented when repeated. I'll continue to remind them of such.



RE: Proposed Transitional Shelter

I am writing on behalf of Peninsula United Church to encourage and support efforts to find a location for a transitional shelter in White Rock.

As you may know, Peninsula United Church (and its predecessor congregations) has partnered with Options Community Services for many years to provide shelter to homeless members of our community during episodes of extreme weather. Options provides trained staff to manage the core shelter functions. As many as 55 volunteers from Peninsula United Church and from the community at large work early morning or late evening shifts to provide meals and emergency clothing to our guests.

There is broad community support, including among neighbouring businesses, for the for the shelter, as witnessed by the large number of volunteers, donors of food, clothing, supplies, and regular, favourable coverage by the Peace Arch News.

For ten years, the Extreme Weather Shelter operated on the site of the former First United Church on Semiahmoo Ave, until that building was demolished. For the past two winters, we have been grateful for the generosity of Star of the Sea Parish in enabling the shelter to operate at the Parish Hall. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, that facility is now closed.

While the weather is improving, the Covid-19 pandemic presents unique problems for the homeless members of our community. Lacking a place to live, they are unable to stay home. This not only increases risk to them, it also the whole community. A meaningful response to this would be to provide a space where guests can be sheltered, their health monitored, while maintaining safe physical distancing.

During this extraordinary time when activities at White Rock Community Centre are shut down, we understand there is a possibility that space could be made available to shelter homeless people. This could be an excellent, temporary solution. It is centrally-located, with a variety of spaces that could facilitate safe physical distancing. We do not anticipate there being more than 10 to 15 guests, who would not arrive until later in the evening, and leave no later than 7:00 am.

At times like this, it is in all of our interests to look out for each other, and that includes our homeless neighbours. We hope that Council will give this proposal its favourable consideration.

At last night's council meeting, we unanimously approved the use of the parking lot at Johnston and Russell for food distribution, effective 22nd April.

We did not approve the use of the White Rock Community Centre as a transitional shelter. Staff's primary concerns were threefold:

• the potential need to use the centre for municipal emergency services, as evidenced by the residents displaced by the building fire on Foster Street last week;

ensuring the facility received a deep cleaning every morning for staff who continue to work at the centre;

• getting buy-in from the two stratas in the residences above the centre.

Speaking only for myself, I think the third point would take the longest to resolve as in-person consultation during this emergency would only delay implementing the shelter.

However, I did table a subsequent motion for the mayor and staff to work with faith-based groups in our community to find an alternate site by 22nd April. We are optimistic that this can happen.

We recognise the critical need for a transitional shelter and will continue to work with you both and community stakeholders to make it happen.

I wonder how effective this will be. For example when guests leave in the morning, who will ensure they follow these same measures when they are out during the day? I saw three of the local homeless/drug addicts just last night huddled together on a bench in Bryant Park, rummaging through bags of clothes! What is the point of social distancing and self isolation when it is only observed for HALF of the time?

I am very concerned about this homeless shelter. Just look at the City of Victoria (Topaz Park) where the homeless have been approved to pitch their tents in certain city parks. This was on Global News on April 20! Since the encampment there has been a 126% increase in calls to Victoria Police since March 15, according to the religious centre across the street from the park. 


Hello, Linda!

White Rock was approached by Options and PH2H to provide a safe shelter space each evening between now and the end of June for the homeless community. None of our city-owned facilities ticked all the boxes, but the White Rock Community Centre came close. However, there were concerns about effectively sterilising the facility afterwards and the city would need permission from the two residential stratas above. The first issue might have been achievable but the second would take longer and, being unable to meet in person, may not have been practical.

Mayor Walker's reached out to the local faith community and we're cautiously optimistic that a short-term solution can be found on one side of 16th or the other. This article is a useful summary of recent council discussion: <u>https://www.peacearchnews.com/news/city-of-white-rock-to-study-transitional-shelter-for-homeless/</u>

Still missing, though, is the long-term solution of a true transitional facility with health and social services available 24/7. With limited land and resources in White Rock, it's more likely this can be located somewhere in the Semiahmoo Town Centre area. While Options does have a number of sites in the Whalley and Newton areas, they've made it clear that they would like a facility in the Peninsula as well.



I know that block is slated for redevelopment as part of the Semiahmoo Town Centre plan, but short-term I thought it would be the perfect location for daytime services: at a transit hub and no residences above or beside to worry about. I've suggested it to **5.22** and Options.

Since land is at such a premium in White Rock, unless transitional housing is sited at PAH as you note, I don't know where it could be located - resident opposition aside. Surrey is more likely. That site behind DQ would probably be ideal.

I'll keep you posted.

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





I've just spoken with the interim priest and people's warden at Church of the Holy Trinity. They were very receptive to the outreach, however they have rented half their hall to a day care for the summer and fall. So, it is not available for a temporary shelter.

They've rented their space out to a daycare because they need the income. This reminds me that it is very worth having a pointed conversation with BC Housing about offering a stipend component for the temporary shelter that would go to the church which would at least cover the expenses. This stipend could help convince an organization or church to open their doors to a shelter.

Meanwhile, Bruce, you were going to follow up on the possibility of Sunnyside (which is likely our best hope) and Kathy is following up with one of the other churches.



I've just spoken with Daisy Stapleton of BC Housing about the hopes of carrying on the temporary shelter in our area for the rest of the summer. I told her that we thought we could find another site as Peace Portal Alliance was not available. She indicated that there is funding for it. Since then, I've spoken with Bruce Strom of Options for whom this was new information as he was clearly led to believe that there was no funding. However, he already received an email from Daisy, likely just after I called her, to say that funding was available for the Peninsula.

So, i've talked with Bruce just a few minutes ago. He will contact the city of Surrey directly about the possibility of the Sunnyside Hall as a site. I told him that **s. 22** had visited the site and thought that it could work, even though it has no shower. In addition, I said that Kathy you could pursue a request to the Lutheran church and I will follow up with the Anglican church, about using their sites for the summer.

It does my heart good to think that we might be able to maintain a temporary site here. And Bruce is keen to followup on behalf of Options. He says we could do a relatively quick turnaround if everything was in place.

Thank you for your prompt reply. I was disappointed that my concern was turfed to Surrey. Would they not have the same challenges with COVID as White Rock?

I know that Peace Portal EWS is receiving 10,000 masks, so they may be able to provide some for a warming shelter. I would hate for a homeless person to freeze to death on the streets of White Rock/South Surrey because COVID protocol could not be implemented at a warming shelter. Perhaps you could contact other municipalities who have warming shelters and ask how they are managing. I know Union Gospel Mission could probably give you some support and advice.

Passing the responsibility onto another jurisdiction is not the answer.

I will forward this to Ms. Locke in hopes that she will be more willing to find a solution. This is an urgent and immediate crisis!

I have volunteered at the former EWS location and the Rotary meal program as well and understand the need in our community is greater than many people realise.

The city assessed its facilities this time last year when Star of the Sea was unable to open on

occasion. Staff looked at our various facilities then and concluded that, unfortunately, none of them would be suitable replacements:

White Rock Community Centre (WRCC)

The kitchen at WRCC is only suitable for food warming, not food preparation. There is no stove, grill or exhaust fan. It does not meet Fraser Health's requirements for a food preparation kitchen. There are also no showers.

Centre for Active Living (CAL)

The rink dry floor space, kitchen, cafeteria area and upstairs lounge at CAL are also part of the space leased to the Peace Arch Curling Club. The Curling Club subleases the kitchen to Candlelight Cuisine, which is currently in operation providing a meal pickup and delivery service, therefore, it is not available.

Of the other spaces in CAL, one of the fitness studios upstairs is leased to Fraser Health, and the lower floor offices are leased to a variety of not for profit health services agencies. The only City controlled spaces in CAL are very small (Education Room and one small cardio gym) which are inadequate to be used for sleeping space for visitors to an isolation centre. There are two showers in the building i.e. one in the men's change room and one in the women's change room.

Centennial Arena

The kitchen at Centennial Arena is leased by the City to a private contractor to use as a concession for servicing arena users and visitors. The kitchen is very small and only suitable for preparing food items such as hot dogs, popcorn, hamburgers and french fries. All the cooking equipment in the kitchen (other than the appliances) belong to the concession operator. The City would have to break the lease with the contractor if it wanted to reallocate the kitchen for use by another group.

Centennial Arena contains an ammonia ice plant. Under Technical Safety BC Regulations, a certified refrigeration operator must be in the building for the entire duration the facility is being used by the public. This is to ensure that trained staff are on hand to respond appropriately to alarms and hazards such as an ammonia leak. Providing a certified refrigeration operator 24/7 in the arena for the two month duration of the isolation centre operation would be very expensive (roughly \$54,000).

The 2,100 square foot Hall at Centennial Arena is designated as the City's Emergency Support Services Reception Centre. This room is equipped with a supply of all the necessary supplies and equipment needed for the City's ESS Reception Centre Team to respond to emergencies in our community.

Kent Street Activity Centre (KSAC)

The kitchen at KSAC is leased to the Kent Street Seniors Society to operate as a kitchen. The kitchen is subleased to a chef (Mrs. Laurie Hassell) who prepares meals for seniors at KSAC. All the kitchen appliances and cooking equipment in the kitchen belong to the Society or Mrs Hassell.

This staff assessment was for use of city facilities as an EWS, and you've asked about a

warming centre for daytime use. What's changed in the ensuing year is that mask-wearing is now mandatory at all times inside city facilities and Covid-related cleaning protocols have increased. It's unlikely that one of these facilities could be used under those circumstances.

I mentioned yesterday during Sources' monthly CAT meeting that the former Westminster Savings building, just across in Surrey at 16th & 152, next to Sawbucks, has been up for lease for about a year. It's an ideal location for a warming centre and drop-in resource for those in need. Please contact Surrey Councillor Brenda Locke (<u>brenda.locke@surrey.ca</u>) as this is in her jurisdiction and an issue she is also quite passionate about.

Mr. Mayor, for the past few years I have volunteered at the Extreme Weather Shelter (EWS) and I know you have come for a few breakfasts in the past. I thank you for your interest.

During this extreme cold weather, our EWS guests have nowhere to warm up during the day. I was told by one guest that he saves his McDonald's card he gets at the Shelter in the morning and buys coffee throughout the day so he can warm up, otherwise he is sitting on a bench in the cold. Many of the guests are not healthy and may be more vulnerable in the cold than the rest of us.

I am asking for the City of White Rock to set up a warming place to accommodate those left "out in the cold", so that they can warm up during the day time.

I would hope that this location would be near the hilltop, as that is where many of the guests are during the day, perhaps there is a room in the Community Centre that could be used temporarily during this weather emergency. The room where the homeless count was centred may work if it is unused at the this time.

All you have to do is go outside for 30 minutes and you will want to come back into the warmth of your home; the people using the shelter do not have that option and are often asked to leave areas like malls, grocery stores etc. if they go inside to get warm.

Please do what you can, I know you can!

I am willing to help "staff" a warming room, if volunteers are needed.

I am writing to add my voice to others requesting that the Cities of Surrey and White Rock establish one or more temporary warming centres, open during extreme weather conditions, that homeless people can access while shelters are closed during the day.

Other cities have been able to set up such programs; I'm sure they would share what they've learned

with you to make it as easy as possible for you to act quickly, particularly now when the pandemic is making every action more complicated. Then this could provide city staff with the experience and impetus to come up with a longer-term plan for this sort of weather, so that help could be offered quickly the next time it's needed by these vulnerable members of our population.

Several people from the church I attend, Peninsula United Church, are actively involved as volunteers in serving the homeless, although the pandemic has curtailed many of their activities for the sake of public safety. They tell me that 40 per cent of the people who sleep at the shelter at Peace Portal Alliance Church are seniors. These are people who have spent much of their lives contributing to society; the least we can do is help them now. We don't know the stories behind all the people who are homeless, but that doesn't matter. They still deserve to be warm and dry.

Dear Mayor and Council,

As you are aware The Peace Portal Church/Options has been operating a weather shelter for homeless individuals since November 2020. As the volunteer food coordinator for the shelter I have an understanding of the support that is needed for these vulnerable people in our community. The needs of the 30 plus shelter guests are definitely being met each night from 8:00 pm to 7 AM with warm drinks, food, dry clothing and a comfortable place to sleep. However, it is in the early morning when they must leave the shelter and return to the streets that our community is failing them. Many of the usual places where homeless individuals gather during the cold wet days such as Recreation centres, and libraries are currently not available due to Covid restrictions.

To my knowledge there are no "drop in" centers here in the South Surrey/ White Rock area. We know that Vancouver and other cities are now opening warming centers in some of their city owned buildings during the recent cold weather to supplement their existing shelters and I am curious to know if White Rock/South Surrey also has plans to do? Shouldn't the city have the responsibility to open and utilize community centres and other public spaces to help the most vulnerable citizens in our community by

providing a warm safe, dry place during the day in these cold winter months.

I ask that you give thoughtful consideration to this very important issue and thereby develop a strategy for a temporary warming shelter in the South Surrey/ White Rock area. There is need for such a plan both for the immediate short term, and also for the future.

I would like to leave you with a quote from one of our shelter guests. They write "I appreciate everything that is given to me at the shelter but when we are awoken at 6 to prepare to leave, I dread the day. I try to stay warm, and even though the shelter provides us with warm coats, and a gift cards, when we try to escape the weather we are constantly asked to leave establishments almost as we enter. This recent blast of winter weather has created an even greater emergency for the homeless members of our community. I implore you to respond immediately to the urgent need for a temporary daytime warming center for homeless people in our community.

Prior to this cold snap there were up to 20 guests each night at the Cold Weather Shelter at Peace Portal Alliance Church. That number has since increased to over 30 guests. Each morning when the guests leave the shelter they face a long, cold day until the doors open again for them at the Shelter. One of the Shelter guests offered this stark description of the current situation:

"I appreciate everything that is given to me at the shelter, but when we are woken up at 6 am to prepare to leave, I dread the day. I try to stay warm, and even though the church/shelter

provides us with warm clothes, shoes, coats and a gift card to stay dry and escape the weather, we are constantly asked to leave the establishments almost as we are entering. It's awful and I am made out to feel like I have done something wrong. I haven't committed any crimes, I am just a man at the end of his page, you know what I mean? A warming centre would mean I would have somewhere to go, somewhere where I wouldn't be asked to leave or be judged, somewhere where I can get back on my feet. "

The members of Peninsula United Church, who volunteer at the Cold Weather Shelter and support it, fear for the safety and literally the lives of our homeless neighbours. In addition to our church members there are many concerned citizens in our community who are willing to offer hospitality to create a safe and welcoming warming centre. We need the city to open up one or more public buildings that are currently closed due to the pandemic. The vulnerable homeless members of our community need you to act now.

Dear Mayor and Council,

As I sit typing in my warm home I am acutely aware of how cold it is outside. I am also acutely aware that due to Covid many of the usual places where homeless people can gather for hours in Rec Centres and Libraries now have very strict occupancy times as do McDonalds, Tim Hortons and other fast food restaurants.

Where can folks keep warm? Perhaps you are wondering about that too.

About the 34 people who are currently coming to Peace Portal Alliance Church for a safe warm refuge at 8 pm.

Our church, Peninsula United, has coordinated the Extreme Weather Shelter in South Surrey/White Rock for many years (currently hosted by Peace Portal Church), but we have never been so afraid for the safety and literally the lives of our homeless guests as we are now.

As you may know, guests must leave the Shelter at 7 in the morning. They receive a one way bus ticket and a \$10 food card. That does not last long.

In some places, like Vancouver there are a lot of drop in centres like First United and the Gospel Mission where folks can be safe and warm. Vancouver is also opening warming centres in their buildings right now during the cold spike in weather (Vanc Aquatic Centre/Britannia) It is part of their emergency action plan to supplement existing Shelter spaces.

Does City of Surrey and or White Rock have such a plan?

There are no "drop in" centres that are open most days here in South Surrey/White Rock due to Covid. Surely there are City owned spaces which are currently available. A kitchen is not needed as we do not use one at the current Shelter. A shower is not necessary either. Volunteers are not present with the guests in our current location but we provide clothing and other supports.

All that is needed is a room, some chairs/tables and heat. Options may be able to help with staffing....it seems that Vancouver has a plan for staffing their centres.

I know there is an emergency planned space in White Rock. Could this be used for this temporary emergency? If this is not an emergency I don't know what is. Form a partnership between White Rock and Surrey? At least to cover the area?

I realize there are challenges and concerns, but this is a humanitarian emergency. The churches are doing their part; it would be wonderful if the Cities of Surrey and White Rock could help the most needy in the community by providing a warm space in the daytime for a limited time.

I believe "where there is a will there is a way" and that way does not always mean that the churches have to provide all the help.

The City has an important role to play in keeping everyone, especially the vulnerable safe and especially during Covid times.

I know that even with my long down jacket, decent gloves and hat, I can only stand to be outside in these cold temperatures and wind for a few minutes at a time. My heart breaks for people in our community who have no place to get warm during the days now. I am appreciative to know that the overnight shelter is up and running at Peace Portal Church, but these individuals have to leave the premises at 7:00 a.m., most with absolutely no where to go to get warm. Please, this cannot wait for even one day longer! These people who have been less fortunate for whatever reasons (health, mental health, addictions, etc.) need to be shown care by our community. There are many empty city buildings right now, please take advantage of them and allow people to get in from the elements today! This cannot wait. I feel terrible that you are not even going to be getting this letter until after the worst of these extreme temperatures are felt, but even on "regular" cold, wet days these folks need a place to be warm. Hello Mayor and Council,

As I sit typing in my warm home I am acutely aware of how cold it is outside.

I am also acutely aware that due to Covid many of the usual places where homeless people can gather for hours in Rec Centres and Libraries now have very strict occupancy times as do

MacDonalds, Tim Hortons and other fast food restaurants.

Where can folks keep warm?

Perhaps you are wondering about that too.

About the 34 people who are currently coming to Peace Portal Alliance Church for a safe warm refuge at 8 pm.

Although I have been involved with Peninsula United in many capacities with the Extreme Weather Shelter for 7 years, I have never been so afraid for the safety and literally the lives of our homeless guests.

Some of you know that guests must leave the Shelter at 7 in the morning.

They receive a one way bus ticket and a \$10 food card. That does not last long.

In some places, like Vancouver there are a lot of drop in centres like First United and the Gospel Mission where folks can be safe and warm. Vancouver is also opening warming centres in their buildings right now during the cold spike in weather (Vanc Aquatic Centre/Britannia) It is part of their emergency action plan to supplement existing Shelter spaces.

Does White Rock City have such a plan?

There are no "drop in" centres that are open most days here in White Rock due to Covid.

There are assuredly empty City owned spaces.

A kitchen is not needed as we do not use one at the current Shelter.

A shower is not necessary either.

Volunteers are not present with the guests in our current location but we provide clothing and other supports.

Sources food truck provides sandwiches.

All that is needed is a room, some chairs/tables and heat. Options may be able to help with staffing....it seems that Vanc has a plan for staffing their centres.

I know there is an emergency planned space in White Rock.

Could this be used for this temporary emergency? If this is not an emergency I don't know what is. Perhaps you are waiting for a tsunami or another cataclysmic event.

In a previous submission to Council last spring the City Manager was very opposed to a plan for a spring shelter although all the City Buildings were closed.

He cited loss of rental income when no income would have been realized due to Covid.

He came up with objection, after objection. As I worked for government I understand that language. His word seemed to be gospel and their was no interest to pursue the matter further.

I wonder what the gospel does say about looking after the poor and the homeless?

The churches are doing their part, it would be wonderful if the City of White Rock could help the most needy in the community by providing a warm space in the daytime for a limited time.

I wonder what role the City could play in helping besides providing a parking lot for the lunch program?

That certainly has generated tremendous funds from very generous donors in the community.

As it is my husband's Rotary Club and yours Darryl perhaps more funds could be generated to help with a daytime centre.

I believe "where there is a will there is a way" and that way does not always mean that the churches have to provide all the help.

The City has an important role to play in keeping everyone, especially the vulnerable safe and especially during Covid times.

Dear Mayor and Council Members:

We are writing to you to express our deep concern about the immediate need for more daytime warming centres for the homeless in our City.

Imagine the distress that it must cause to those who are lucky enough to get a spot in an overnight shelter only to be awoken at 6am and put outside by 7am in this cold weather. The suffering of

those who are not lucky enough to find even that brief shelter, and who must remain outside 24 hours a day fighting just to stay warm and dry, is unconscionable.

The few places where the homeless were welcome during the day are currently closed and they are denied even temporary safe refuge by lingering in restaurants during these times. It is inhumane to force people to spend endless hours outside during these cold periods. We are saddened to hear that 40% of those currently at the Peace Portal Alliance Church overnight shelter are seniors. This vulnerable population deserves much better treatment than simply being tossed outside.

It is time for immediate, creative solutions. Due to the pandemic, there are ample unused civic spaces that could easily be made available such as curling rinks, community center gyms, etc. It is time for the City to work with Societies, charities, and not-for-profit organizations to provide much needed services to the homeless in our community.

We call upon you to cut through the bureaucracy and the superficial list of excuses and take action to do the right thing and make a positive difference.

Hi, Brenda! You're welcome. All good here. I'm grateful to now have the ability to do both of my jobs from home. It makes a big difference.

I understand the frustration of the residents who wrote in over the weekend, and I really feel for those on the streets in any kind of weather. I wish it was as simple as opening a building and turning on the lights - it isn't! So much has to align. The time to plan for next winter is now.

It's not something that Surrey or White Rock can solve on their own, either. A warming centre just kicks the can down the road. The problem is so much bigger than a cup of coffee and a place to hang out. Long-term housing and counseling are the solutions needed, and that should come from Victoria and Ottawa. We're all in this together.

Here's a summary our Director of Recreation & Culture put together for us this time last year, when Star of the Sea wasn't able to open and an EWS was needed. It's what ultimately led to Mayor Walker working with Peace Portal to establish the shelter that's open now.

White Rock Community Centre (WRCC)

The kitchen at WRCC is only suitable for food warming, not food preparation. There is no stove, grill or exhaust fan. It does not meet Fraser Health's requirements for a food preparation kitchen. There are also no showers.

Centre for Active Living (CAL)

The rink dry floor space, kitchen, cafeteria area and upstairs lounge at CAL are also part of the space leased to the Peace Arch Curling Club. The Curling Club subleases the kitchen to Candlelight Cuisine, which is currently in operation providing a meal pickup and delivery service, therefore, it is not available.

Of the other spaces in CAL, one of the fitness studios upstairs is leased to Fraser Health, and the lower floor offices are leased to a variety of not for profit health services agencies. The only City controlled spaces in CAL are very small (Education Room and one small cardio gym) which are inadequate to be used for sleeping space for visitors to an isolation centre. There are two showers in the building i.e. one in the men's change room and one in the women's change room.

Centennial Arena

The kitchen at Centennial Arena is leased by the City to a private contractor to use as a concession for servicing arena users and visitors. The kitchen is very small and only suitable for preparing food items such as hot dogs, popcorn, hamburgers and french fries. All the cooking equipment in the kitchen (other than the appliances) belong to the concession operator. The City would have to break the lease with the contractor if it wanted to reallocate the kitchen for use by another group.

Centennial Arena contains an ammonia ice plant. Under Technical Safety BC Regulations, a certified refrigeration operator must be in the building for the entire duration the facility is being used by the public. This is to ensure that trained staff are on hand to respond appropriately to alarms and hazards such as an ammonia leak. Providing a certified refrigeration operator 24/7 in the arena for the two month duration of the isolation centre operation would be very expensive (roughly \$54,000).

The 2,100 square foot Hall at Centennial Arena is designated as the City's Emergency Support Services Reception Centre. This room is equipped with a supply of all the necessary supplies and equipment needed for the City's ESS Reception Centre Team to respond to emergencies in our community.

Kent Street Activity Centre (KSAC)

The kitchen at KSAC is leased to the Kent Street Seniors Society to operate as a kitchen. The kitchen is subleased to a chef (Mrs. Laurie Hassell) who prepares meals for seniors at KSAC. All the kitchen appliances and cooking equipment in the kitchen belong to the Society or Mrs Hassell.

All those challenges remain, plus the added constraints related to the PHO.

Check out another email that I copied you on, the one about the former Westminster Savings at 16th & 152nd. I think it's the perfect location for something like this. If Sources and/or Options can work out a deal for the lease, a solution might be available in just a few months. But note that the realtor/owner was asking for indemnification, which is something White Rock can't offer as the property is in Surrey.

Let's keep each other posted. We'll get through this.

One of your counselors Christopher Trevelyn is under the impression that the City of White Rock provided support to the Star of the Sea Shelter. This is not true but we did appreciate some members of council visiting and helping a couple of times in the Shelter along with the other 50 dedicated volunteers who have supported the Shelter for over 12 years.

I am wondering about your emergency site? Did you house people affected by the 5 corners fire a few years ago?

Below I list a number of cities that work with others to provide a space in one of their buildings.

In Courtenay the city has leased one of their sites without charge.

It is a partnership usually between a non-profit and the city.

Is White Rock open to such a partnership?

If City Council told the City Manager they wanted to lease a space, just as other cities have done, could this not be done?

As previously noted we do not need a kitchen or a shower.

Only access to a washroom.

Perhaps White Rock staff could zoom meet with staff from other cities where this kind of shelter has been possible.

It seems "if there is a will, there is a way."

Many of us are very happy to meet with you to "find that way."

Brenda Locke has said that she does not understand why cities do not open centres. These are her words to me yesterday:

Dear Mayors and Members of Council,

I am writing to add my voice to others requesting that the Cities of Surrey and White Rock establish one or more temporary warming centres, open during extreme weather conditions, that homeless people can access while shelters are closed during the day. Other cities have been able to set up such programs; I'm sure they would share what they've learned with you to make it as easy as possible for you to act quickly, particularly now when the pandemic is making every action more complicated. Then this could provide city staff with the experience and impetus to come up with a longer-term plan for this sort of weather, so that help could be offered quickly the next time it's needed by these vulnerable members of our population.

Several people from the church I attend, Peninsula United Church, are actively involved as volunteers in serving the homeless, although the pandemic has curtailed many of their activities for the sake of public safety. Dear Mayor and Council,

As you are aware The Peace Portal Church/Options has been operating a weather shelter for homeless individuals since November 2020. As the volunteer food coordinator for the shelter I have an understanding of the support that is needed for these vulnerable people in our community. The needs of the 30 plus shelter guests are definitely being met each night from 8:00 pm to 7 AM with warm drinks, food, dry clothing and a comfortable place to sleep. However, it is in the early morning when they must leave the shelter and return to the streets that our community is failing them. Many of the usual places where homeless individuals gather during the cold wet days such as Recreation centres, and libraries are currently not available due to Covid restrictions.

To my knowledge there are no "drop in" centers here in the South Surrey/ White Rock area. We know that Vancouver and other cities are now opening warming centers in some of their city owned buildings during the recent cold weather to supplement their existing shelters and I am curious to know if White Rock/South Surrey also has plans to do? Shouldn't the city have the responsibility to open and utilize community centres and other public spaces to help the most vulnerable citizens in our community by providing a warm safe, dry place during the day in these cold winter months.

I ask that you give thoughtful consideration to this very important issue and thereby develop a strategy for a temporary warming shelter in the South Surrey/ White Rock area. There is need for such a plan both for the immediate short term, and also for the future.

I would like to leave you with a quote from one of our shelter guests. They write "I appreciate everything that is given to me at the shelter but when we are awoken at 6 to prepare to leave, I dread the day. I try to stay warm, and even though the shelter provides us with warm coats, and a gift cards, when we try to escape the weather we are constantly asked to leave establishments almost as we enter. Having a warming centre would give me the opportunity of a safe warm and dry place to stay each day. "

This recent blast of winter weather has created an even greater emergency for the homeless members of our community. I implore you to respond immediately to the urgent need for a temporary daytime warming center for homeless people in our community.

Prior to this cold snap there were up to 20 guests each night at the Cold Weather Shelter at Peace Portal Alliance Church. That number has since increased to over 30 guests. Each morning when the guests leave the shelter they face a long, cold day until the doors open again for them at the Shelter. One of the Shelter guests offered this stark description of the current situation:

"I appreciate everything that is given to me at the shelter, but when we are woken up at 6 am to prepare to leave, I dread the day. I try to stay warm, and even though the church/shelter

provides us with warm clothes, shoes, coats and a gift card to stay dry and escape the weather, we are constantly asked to leave the establishments almost as we are entering. It's awful and I am made out to feel like I have done something wrong. I haven't committed any crimes, I am just a man at the end of his page, you know what I mean? A warming centre would mean I would have somewhere to go, somewhere where I wouldn't be asked to leave or be judged, somewhere where I can get back on my feet. "

The members of Peninsula United Church, who volunteer at the Cold Weather Shelter and support it, fear for the safety and literally the lives of our homeless neighbours. In addition to our church members there are many concerned citizens in our community who are willing to offer hospitality to create a safe and welcoming warming centre. Dear Mayor and Council,

As I sit typing in my warm home I am acutely aware of how cold it is outside. I am also acutely aware that due to Covid many of the usual places where homeless people can gather for hours in Rec Centres and Libraries now have very strict occupancy times as do McDonalds, Tim Hortons and other fast food restaurants.

Where can folks keep warm? Perhaps you are wondering about that too.

About the 34 people who are currently coming to Peace Portal Alliance Church for a safe warm refuge at 8 pm.

Our church, Peninsula United, has coordinated the Extreme Weather Shelter in South Surrey/White Rock for many years (currently hosted by Peace Portal Church), but we have never been so afraid for the safety and literally the lives of our homeless guests as we are now.

As you may know, guests must leave the Shelter at 7 in the morning. They receive a one way bus ticket and a \$10 food card. That does not last long.

In some places, like Vancouver there are a lot of drop in centres like First United and the Gospel Mission where folks can be safe and warm. Vancouver is also opening warming centres in their buildings right now during the cold spike in weather (Vanc Aquatic Centre/Britannia) It is part of their emergency action plan to supplement existing Shelter spaces.

Does City of Surrey and or White Rock have such a plan?

There are no "drop in" centres that are open most days here in South Surrey/White Rock due to Covid. Surely there are City owned spaces which are currently available. A kitchen is not needed as we do not use one at the current Shelter. A shower is not necessary either. Volunteers are not present with the guests in our current location but we provide clothing and other supports.

All that is needed is a room, some chairs/tables and heat. Options may be able to help with staffing....it seems that Vancouver has a plan for staffing their centres.

I know there is an emergency planned space in White Rock. Could this be used for this temporary emergency? If this is not an emergency I don't know what is. Form a partnership between White Rock and Surrey? At least to cover the area?

I realize there are challenges and concerns, but this is a humanitarian emergency. The churches are doing their part; it would be wonderful if the Cities of Surrey and White Rock could help the most needy in the community by providing a warm space in the daytime for a limited time.

I believe "where there is a will there is a way" and that way does not always mean that the churches have to provide all the help.

The City has an important role to play in keeping everyone, especially the vulnerable safe and especially during Covid times.



As I mentioned before, it is not as simple as unlocking the doors to one of our buildings. Volunteers cannot staff a municipal building without the presence of city employees, and the PHO makes deploying them problematic.

The current EWS shelter exists because of the work the City of White Rock did last year with Pastor Lefavre and his colleagues at Peace Portal. Have you also asked Holy Trinity or St. John's to open their halls? Elks Lodge?

BTW, the residents displaced by the Five Corners fire were never housed at Centennial Arena. That was a staging area the day of the fire while the Red Cross found them temporary accommodations.

I wonder if the City of White Rock and/or Surrey could pay (from emergency funds) for some space during the day as a warming centre, somewhere accessible to the homeless (e.g. within a short walk of uptown). What about the cafe on George street??? It is currently not open.

A municipality can only compel a property owner to act on a bylaw violation. Opening a shuttered property must be a voluntarily decision by the owner. Provincial funding would be a more appropriate source of support for any initiative which, in my opinion, must be long-term and carefully thought out. Please contact our MLA, Trevor Halford.

As I sit typing in my warm home I am acutely aware of how cold it is outside.

I am also acutely aware that due to Covid many of the usual places where homeless people can gather for hours in Rec Centres and Libraries now have very strict occupancy times as do MacDonalds, Tim Hortons and other fast food restaurants.

Where can folks keep warm?

Perhaps you are wondering about that too.

About the 34 people who are currently coming to Peace Portal Alliance Church for a safe warm refuge at 8 pm.

Although I have been involved with Peninsula United in many capacities with the Extreme Weather Shelter for 7 years, I have never been so afraid for the safety and literally the lives of our homeless guests.

Some of you know that guests must leave the Shelter at 7 in the morning.

They receive a one way bus ticket and a \$10 food card. That does not last long.

In some places, like Vancouver there are a lot of drop in centres like First United and the Gospel Mission where folks can be safe and warm. Vancouver is also opening warming centres in their buildings right now during the cold spike in weather (Vanc Aquatic Centre/Britannia) It is part of their emergency action plan to supplement existing Shelter

spaces.

Does White Rock City have such a plan?

There are no "drop in" centres that are open most days here in White Rock due to Covid. There are assuredly empty City owned spaces.

A kitchen is not needed as we do not use one at the current Shelter.

A shower is not necessary either.

Volunteers are not present with the guests in our current location but we provide clothing and other supports.

Sources food truck provides sandwiches.

All that is needed is a room, some chairs/tables and heat. Options may be able to help with staffing....it seems that Vanc has a plan for staffing their centres.

I know there is an emergency planned space in White Rock.

Could this be used for this temporary emergency? If this is not an emergency I don't know

what is.

Perhaps you are waiting for a tsunami or another cataclysmic event.

In a previous submission to Council last spring the City Manager was very opposed to a plan for a spring shelter although all the City Buildings were closed.

He cited loss of rental income when no income would have been realized due to Covid. He came up with objection, after objection. As I worked for government I understand that language.

His word seemed to be gospel and their was no interest to pursue the matter further. I wonder what the gospel does say about looking after the poor and the homeless?

The churches are doing their part, it would be wonderful if the City of White Rock could help the most needy in the community by providing a warm space in the daytime for a limited time.

I wonder what role the City could play in helping besides providing a parking lot for the lunch program?

That certainly has generated tremendous funds from very generous donors in the community.

As it is my husband's Rotary Club and yours Darryl perhaps more funds could be generated to help with a daytime centre.

I believe "where there is a will there is a way" and that way does not always mean that the churches have to provide all the help.

The City has an important role to play in keeping everyone, especially the vulnerable safe and especially during Covid times.



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

Hello, Stephen.

As you may already be aware, the White Rock/South Surrey area is in desperate need for a permanent facility that can serve as a shelter at night and an outreach/warming centre during the day. Peace Portal Alliance has done yeoman's work in operating its shelter every night this winter. They also contribute one day a week to White Rock Rotary's daily community meal program. The shelter will be closing soon, but Rotary intends to keep the lunches going for months to come.

This is a growing area with a reputation for affluence that masks a deeper problem. As more people move into the Peninsula, the issues of addiction, inadequate mental health services and homelessness follow. In response to a staff report at last night's council meeting on setting up a temporary warming tent, I moved that White Rock work with Surrey and community stakeholders to find a permanent solution before next winter. (By the time the tent would be installed, portable washrooms sourced, etc., this season would be almost over.)

White Rock is small - only 6 square kilometers. We don't have much municipal land to offer, our facilities are inadequate to support the need, and our pockets aren't very deep. We're surrounded on three sides by Surrey, and their growth is largely driving the increased demand for services. Any solution needs to have their commitment and contribution.

There's a former Westminster Savings & Loan branch at 16th & 152nd, just across the municipal line. It's at a major intersection with heavy foot traffic, and adjacent to a transit hub. A mall is across the street, which has a food court where a number of the area's homeless already gather during the day. Because the property is outside White Rock, my advocating for its use can only go so far.

I'm hoping HSA can help somehow? Lobby for funding? Connect other community partners? Attached is information on the property. I've shared it with Bruce Strom of Options as well.


This past winter shelter volunteers were from Peace Portal Alliance, Star of the Sea, Peninsula United and the local community.

Here's the staff review of municipal facilities and how they could possibly serve as a shelter:

White Rock Community Centre (WRCC)

The kitchen at WRCC is only suitable for food warming, not food preparation. There is no stove, grill or exhaust fan. It does not meet Fraser Health's requirements for a food preparation kitchen. There are also no showers.

Centre for Active Living (CAL)

The rink dry floor space, kitchen, cafeteria area and upstairs lounge at CAL are also part of the space leased to the Peace Arch Curling Club. The Curling Club subleases the kitchen to Candlelight Cuisine, which is currently in operation providing a meal pickup and delivery service, therefore, it is not available.

Of the other spaces in CAL, one of the fitness studios upstairs is leased to Fraser Health, and the lower floor offices are leased to a variety of not for profit health services agencies. The only City controlled spaces in CAL are very small (Education Room and one small cardio gym) which are inadequate to be used for sleeping space for visitors to an isolation centre. There are two showers in the building i.e. one in the men's change room and one in the women's change room.

Centennial Arena

The kitchen at Centennial Arena is leased by the City to a private contractor to use as a concession for servicing arena users and visitors. The kitchen is very small and only suitable for preparing food items such as hot dogs, popcorn, hamburgers and french fries. All the cooking equipment in the kitchen (other than the appliances) belong to the concession operator. The City would have to break the lease with the contractor if it wanted to reallocate the kitchen for use by another group.

Centennial Arena contains an ammonia ice plant. Under Technical Safety BC Regulations, a certified refrigeration operator must be in the building for the entire duration the facility is being used by the public. This is to ensure that trained staff are on hand to respond appropriately to alarms and hazards such as an ammonia leak. Providing a certified refrigeration operator 24/7 in the arena for the two month duration of the isolation centre operation would be very expensive (roughly \$54,000).

The 2,100 square foot Hall at Centennial Arena is designated as the City's Emergency Support Services Reception Centre. This room is equipped with a supply of all the necessary supplies and equipment needed for the City's ESS Reception Centre Team to respond to emergencies in our community.

Kent Street Activity Centre (KSAC)

The kitchen at KSAC is leased to the Kent Street Seniors Society to operate as a kitchen. The kitchen is subleased to a chef (Mrs. Laurie Hassell) who prepares meals for seniors at KSAC. All the kitchen appliances and cooking equipment in the kitchen belong to the Society or Mrs Hassell.

You asked me about warming centres plans for this year.

The only extreme weather center is at the following locations and times:

Here are the times that amount Olive Lutheran Church are open as an Extreme Weather Shelter. Mt. Olive Lutheran Church <u>2350 148th Street</u> Surrey 20 spaces- Adult 19+ <u>10pm-7am</u>

There are **no indoor facilities available in SS/WR for people to go between 7 am and 10 pm**, or on days that are not deemed extreme weather days.

On March 8 staff presented a corporate report to Council (attached) with options for accommodating people experiencing homelessness in WR. The recommended option was a large tent with propane heaters at Centennial Park parking lot. Cost is estimated at 10k per month plus providing at least two trained social workers – this was not supported by Council, however Council could revisit this if you would like us to purse it this year.

We do not have any unused civic facilities to address this need at this time like we did in the summer during the heat wave; so we are not able to provide this service without cancelling recreation programs.

The City of Surrey has made it clear in our At Risk and Priority Population Task Force meetings that they do not support providing temporary transitional accommodation. They will help fund permanent shelters, but not in South Surrey – council already gave me direction to decline this offer.

Hope this helps; if there is any further direction let me know.

Hello Mayor and Council,

As I sit typing in my warm home I am acutely aware of how cold it is outside.

I am also acutely aware that due to Covid many of the usual places where homeless people can gather for hours in Rec Centres and Libraries now have very strict occupancy times as do

MacDonalds, Tim Hortons and other fast food restaurants.

Where can folks keep warm?

Perhaps you are wondering about that too.

About the 34 people who are currently coming to Peace Portal Alliance Church for a safe warm refuge at 8 pm.

Although I have been involved with Peninsula United in many capacities with the Extreme Weather Shelter for 7 years, I have never been so afraid for the safety and literally the lives of our homeless guests.

Some of you know that guests must leave the Shelter at 7 in the morning.

They receive a one way bus ticket and a \$10 food card. That does not last long.

In some places, like Vancouver there are a lot of drop in centres like First United and the Gospel Mission where folks can be safe and warm. Vancouver is also opening warming centres in their buildings right now during the cold spike in weather (Vanc Aquatic Centre/Britannia) It is part of their emergency action plan to supplement existing Shelter spaces.

Does White Rock City have such a plan?

There are no "drop in" centres that are open most days here in White Rock due to Covid.

There are assuredly empty City owned spaces.

A kitchen is not needed as we do not use one at the current Shelter.

A shower is not necessary either.

Volunteers are not present with the guests in our current location but we provide clothing and other supports.

Sources food truck provides sandwiches.

All that is needed is a room, some chairs/tables and heat. Options may be able to help with staffing....it seems that Vanc has a plan for staffing their centres.

I know there is an emergency planned space in White Rock.

Could this be used for this temporary emergency? If this is not an emergency I don't know what is. Perhaps you are waiting for a tsunami or another cataclysmic event.

In a previous submission to Council last spring the City Manager was very opposed to a plan for a spring shelter although all the City Buildings were closed.

He cited loss of rental income when no income would have been realized due to Covid.

He came up with objection, after objection. As I worked for government I understand that language. His word seemed to be gospel and their was no interest to pursue the matter further.

I wonder what the gospel does say about looking after the poor and the homeless?

The churches are doing their part, it would be wonderful if the City of White Rock could help the most needy in the community by providing a warm space in the daytime for a limited time.

I wonder what role the City could play in helping besides providing a parking lot for the lunch program?

That certainly has generated tremendous funds from very generous donors in the community.

As it is my husband's Rotary Club and yours Darryl perhaps more funds could be generated to help with a daytime centre.

I believe "where there is a will there is a way" and that way does not always mean that the churches have to provide all the help.

The City has an important role to play in keeping everyone, especially the vulnerable safe and especially during Covid times.

I am writing to express my concern for the increasingly cold weather that is upon us and where folx who are without adequate shelter are to go from the hours of 7am to 10pm on the days the EWR shelter opens, and 24 hours a day when the EWR shelter is not open.

This is an extremely long time for people to be outside in the elements, especially over the holidays when many community places are closed or operating at reduced hours. And many people who are homeless and otherwise vulnerable are often not welcomed in businesses or other places they might seek out for some warmth or to access washroom facilities.

If the City of White Rock can open space in times of extreme heat, it would reason that a warming centre could also be opened. This would be life-saving and the right thing to do to over the winter. Particularly when we have ample notice from weather forecasters of the temperature and weather to come.

Many of the people I have met who are experiencing homelessness in the community have connections to the area, some grew up here, attended schools in the area, and so forth. Most importantly, they are human beings who are worthy of our care, of basic needs such as shelter,

warmth and health, and to know they are cared about and valued. Please help provide a warming centre immediately as we face an extremely cold winter. Copied below is Guillermo's December 07, 2021 response to Mayor and Council about warming shelters. He attached a copy of our March 08, 2021 corporate report in which we reviewed the pros and cons of all civic facility options. The recommended option at that time was a tent to be located in the Centennial Park parking lot. Council did not support the recommendation, but did agree to establishing an At Risk and Vulnerable Population Task Force with the City of Surrey and other agencies that provide services for the homeless in WR/SS. This task force has been unable to find a suitable location or venue to address this need. The City of Surrey doesn't support providing warming shelters. They are prepared to buy the land and help fund a permanent homeless shelter, but not in Surrey. Council rejected building a permanent shelter in WR.

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I will respond to **s. 22** who also contacted the Mayor's Office.

As a reminder Councillors, the current practice of directing all correspondence through the CAO's office continues in Guillermo's absence. He asked that I cover for him as Acting CAO, so please direct questions and/or correspondence to me and not to other City staff.

Hello,

I am writing to express my concern for the increasingly cold weather that is upon us and where folx who are without adequate shelter are to go from the hours of 7am to 10pm on the days the EWR shelter opens, and 24 hours a day when the EWR shelter is not open. This is an extremely long time for people to be outside in the elements, especially over the holidays when many community places are closed or operating at reduced hours. And many people who are homeless and otherwise vulnerable are often not welcomed in businesses or other places they might seek out for some warmth or to access washroom facilities. If the City of White Rock can open space in times of extreme heat, it would reason that a warming centre could also be opened. This would be life-saving and the right thing to do to over the winter. Particularly when we have ample notice from weather forecasters of the temperature and weather to come.

Many of the people I have met who are experiencing homelessness in the community have connections to the area, some grew up here, attended schools in the area, and so forth. Most importantly, they are human beings who are worthy of our care, of basic needs such as shelter, warmth and health, and to know they are cared about and valued.

Please help provide a warming centre immediately as we face an extremely cold winter. As noted in the article linked below, this is a great need, as are other services and ultimately, adequate, affordable and safe housing for everyone.

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- City recreation staff are not trained to deal with people facing homelessness (i.e. mental illness, drug addiction etc.). The warming shelter would need to be staffed by at least two social worker with expertise in helping deal with people with mental illnesses, addictions etc. It would be preferable to have both a male and female social worker at all times so that regular checks of the washrooms can take place to prevent drug use and other undesirable behaviors from occurring in the washrooms.

-Consultation with 3 Miramar Strata's, BOSA Properties and other adjacent residents and businesses should be done before operating a homeless shelter at this location. Last year when word got out that the City was being asked to consider WRCC as a warming shelter for the homeless, the 3 Miramar Strata Councils strongly opposed it.

- There is no way of controlling where people go in the Centre as there is no ability to secure a group in the presentation room without them wandering into other areas of the facility because the washrooms are located off the main hallway. Therefore, the entire building would have to be either a warming shelter for the homeless, or a rec centre. It can't be both at the same time.

- Some regular program participants (bridge players etc.) are fragile seniors with vulnerable immune systems and delicate health issues. Odors from smokers, cannabis users and lingering body odor of the unbathed may cause health risks for some of our elderly/frail customers.

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is to locate a large tent on City property, or property owned by another social service provider such as a faith based organization, the Salvation Army, Peace Arch Hospital etc.

Given the direction established by Guillermo before he went on vacation and Eric's detailed response above, I am reluctant to change course at this time.

Hello Mayor and Council:

Eric reached out to Sources and Options to see if they could assist us with staffing, **but they could not on such short notice**. Options did note:

Unfortunately I'm having the same conversation in all the communities Options serves and I don't have any capacity to provide staff for this service. My managers are already having to fill night shifts in order to meet current commitments.

Options Mobile Outreach teams will be providing cold weather gear and food Mon-Friday to unsheltered folk identified throughout Surrey, Delta and White Rock. We are also finding ways to temporarily ignore our capacity limits at our EWR and shelter sites to get more people in out of the bitter cold that's on the way.

So it appears from above that there is some assistance available from Options to the homeless in White Rock.

I note that Chloe of the Homeless Services Association of BC advises that she has identified a community partner that can staff a warming centre. For this to happen at WRCC, I would need to call staff in off holidays to open and close the building and we would need to hire additional janitorial

staff for touch surface cleaning and then a nightly deep cleaning of the facility. Firstly, though I would need to present Council with a budget and provide Council the opportunity to discuss unintended consequences at a Special Council Meeting. Council would then need to direct me to proceed.

Challenges for this last minute initiative include:

- Special Council Meeting needs to be scheduled this weekend before the cold weather starts on Sunday.
- Direction needs to be given to staff.
- Recreation Management staff are either on vacation or sick leave.
- There is no Management staff readily available to coordinate with the community partner identified by Chloe Good other than me as Acting CAO.
- The residents in the condo towers surrounding WRCC may not be supportive.
- It is not clear if the persons needing this service are the same ones attending the overnight warming centre at the Lutheran Church in Surrey. If so, they will need to travel 2.5 kms between sites.
- Although the facility is vacant now due to COVID, there could be a precedent set whereby the same service is expected at other times when Recreation Users would be affected.

Although I understand and support Councillors heartfelt concern for the homeless, I think Council is taking a risk with trying to organize this at the last minute during the holiday season. A well thought out longer term approach following up on last March's Council Report and Guillermo's December 7th email would be my recommendation.

I am not sure of the legislative procedures, but if the majority of Council wishes to discuss this at a Special Meeting, I think the Mayor can call this meeting. By the time this gets done, we will be well into the cold snap.

Unless I hear differently, I will continue with the present direction.

Thank you for following up.

Just wondering if the closure of Gyms and fitness facilities/programming provides new opportunities to bring unsheltered individuals inside.

With the statement released by MHOs in Fraser Health and Vancouver Coastal Health yesterday,

there is a lot of alignment with statements made during the extreme heat events with regards to COVID risks vs the risks of exposure to extreme temperatures.

There are currently no public health restrictions on warming centres. "Health or social services provided to people in need, such as warming or cooling centres are exempt from the Provincial Health Officer Gatherings and Events Order and are not subject to event or capacity limitations as announced on Dec 21, 2021.

With the cold weather we are currently experiencing, Vancouver Coastal Health and Fraser Health recommend that warming centers in our regions operate at full capacity. The risk from exposure to cold weather is of primary concern at this time of year, and a greater risk to health than COVID-19 for the housing insecure.

With the significant risks associated with exposure to below freezing temperatures, are there opportunities to bring non profit partners into municipal spaces to help mobilize temporary emergency responses at this time?

Please let me know if connecting in with non profit partners could help support any short term solutions.

Senior City staff conducted a detailed review of options over the past 24 hours and unfortunately could not identify a short term workable option for a daytime warming centre. The situation for cooling centres last summer differed significantly from todays situation. Factors such as current facilities use, staffing requirements, social worker requirements, COVID are all very different from what we dealt with last summer.

We are reaching out again to inquire whether additional resources will be mobilized due to the dangerous temperatures forecasted in the region. Our understanding is that MHOs in both Fraser Health and Vancouver Coastal Health have issued a statement and a letter was sent to all local governments last week requesting municipalities re-examine any spaces that could be used as EWRs, among other health considerations.

Forecasted temperatures place a substantial threat to the health and safety of individuals who are unhoused.

- Can municipal warming centres open similar to responses issued in the summer during the extreme heat event?
- What is needed to trigger a similar response to lethal conditions in the winter?
- Can temporary warming centres mobilize in vacant commercial spaces as an emergency response to these conditions?

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

Multiple Strong Winter Storms

Event Duration: Tuesday December 21st to Wednesday December 29th, 2021



- Multiple storms will impact the transportation system across BC with snow, blowing snow and freezing rain at times over the next week and a half.
- Very cold air will spread through BC beginning around Christmas Day impacting travellers and vulnerable populations.
- Freezing spray through north and central coastal inlets will impact marine traffic

Certainty _____

- **Pattern: HIGH.** Very cold Arctic air will collide with two or three storms over the holiday season.
- **Freezing rain: MODERATE.** Conditions are set up for patchy to widespread freezing rain over Vancouver Island, the Sunshine Coast and Lower Mainland Tuesday and Wednesday, however, our certainty in its intensity and duration is low.
- **Impacts: HIGH**. Transportation will be the most affected with many parts of the province seeing difficult commuting weather during the holiday travel season.



- Cold Arctic air is forecast to collide with Pacific air at least two or three times in the next week and a half.
- The transportation sector will be highly impacted during the busy holiday travel season.
- The first storm is forecast to affect the Lower Mainland and Southwest Interior with snow and possible freezing rain on Tuesday and Wednesday.
- The second storm will affect the area again on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. This one will bring more snow and blowing snow to the Southern Interior and Coast including much of Vancouver Island.
- Very cold Arctic air will move into the Interior following this second storm around Christmas Day (northern BC) and Boxing Day (southern BC). Strong to very strong Arctic outflow winds will develop through coastal Inlets as temperatures plummet this weekend.
- Hazardous cold and wind chill will develop with the advancing very cold Arctic air.
- There is a possible third colder and more intense system for early to mid next week (between Boxing Day and New Years).

Cold Weather Advisory for housing service providers supporting people who experience homelessness

Environment Canada has issued winter weather advisories for several parts of British Columbia in the upcoming week. This includes Special Weather Statements, Snowfall Warnings, Freezing Rain Warnings, and Winter Storm Warnings.

These warnings will create difficult outdoor conditions such as freezing temperatures, icy road conditions and limited visibility during daytime. We expect these conditions to last for several days, with extreme cold temperatures beginning Sunday, and will be affecting the weather during the day as well as night times.

Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH) Public Health advises that maximize capacity should be permitted in warming centres and Extreme Weather Response shelters. There should not be capacity limits imposed because of concerns about COVID-19; for people who are housing insecure, the risk of severe outcomes from extreme weather is higher than that of COVID-19. Please see information below.

What are the health effects of extreme cold weather?

Exposure to extreme cold weather can be harmful to our health. Some prominent health effects include:

- Wind Burn
 - o Excessive dry skin, redness, soreness, itchiness
- Trench foot
 - o Pain, numbness, leg cramps, swelling, blisters, ulcers, bleeding under the skin, gangrene
- Frost bite
 - o Irritation, tingling and burning, discoloured skin, blistering, ulceration
- Hypothermia
 - Uncontrollable shivering, drowsiness or exhaustion, confusion, tremors, slurred speech, decrease pulse, cardiac arrest or coma (in severe cases)
- Chronic illnesses that can destabilize due to break in continuity of care or access to medicines
 - o Asthma, chronic bronchitis, emphysema
 - Diabetes
 - o Neurological conditions, such as seizure disorders
 - Opioid use disorder
 - o Other chronic diseases
- Injuries
 - Slip and fall in icy conditions
 - o Burns and thermal injuries in case people try to burn paper, wood, or coal to keep warm
 - Carbon monoxide poisoning

Who is at higher risk of health effects due to cold weather?



Public Health Advisory

- People experiencing homelessness or unstably housed
- People living in alone
- People on certain medications
- · People who work or do strenuous physical activities outdoors for long periods of time
- Infants and young children
- Older adults (Age 65 and over)
- People who have physical or mental disabilities

What should housing service providers do?

Housing service providers can take several steps:

Aware

- Monitor news alerts for changing weather patterns
- •Be aware of health effects of cold weather
- •Watch for early warning signs of severe health effects

Alert

•Alert clients and those who support them that winter hazards are expected to occur, or exist •Call 911 in case of hypothermia or frostbite are suspected

Accept

•Continue to accept clients requiring shelter spaces through the extreme weather events •Follow public health recommendations for COVID-19 prevention as far as possible while still accepting the clients; risk from exposure to extreme cold temperatures is of primary concern at this time of year and a greater risk to health than COVID-19 for the housing insecure

Assess

Assess clients' needs for additional warming supports

•Enable clients to take appropriate precautions for winter hazards (e.g. provide additional layers of clothing, socks or shoes)

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Alert

- •Alert clients and those who support them that winter hazards are expected to occur, or exist
- Call 911 in case of hypothermia or frostbite are suspected

Overdose Risk around Holidays

Fraser Health would like to remind folks that people who use illicit substances continue to navigate a highly toxic drug supply.

After the tragic release of the number of loved ones lost in October and November, Fraser Health acknowledges that the currently illicit substances that are circulating are highly toxic and unpredictable.

Overdose events have occurred after using opioids, methamphetamine, ecstasy and cocaine. We are asking everyone to look out for each other as overdose numbers increase over the holiday period.

People are at a higher risk of overdose when:

- Use after a period of not using or reduced use
- Had a previous overdose
- Had a recent illness (including COVID-19)
- Multiple substances are used at the same time

Below is a collection of tips from experts, including people who use substances, on ways to reduce the risks of harm and death:

Precautions around Substances:

- Store substances safely, including medications, where they cannot be reached by others
- **Test the supply.** There are <u>many sites across Fraser Health</u> to access test strips to screen for fentanyl. Checking drugs for multiple substances with the FTIR machine is offered at <u>Starship Health</u> <u>Contact Centre</u> in New Westminster or <u>Get Your Drugs Tested</u> in Vancouver.

Be aware of toxicity:

- Be aware that high levels of toxic fentanyl is present in circulating drug supply.
- Benzodiazepines are found in the drug supply. We are seeing increasing presence of <u>nonmedical</u> <u>benzodiazepines</u>. This increases the risk of drug poisoning and complicates overdose reversal. Intentional or unknown regular use of benzodiazepines can create tolerance and complicated withdrawal that needs medical management.

Reduce Harms from Substances:

- Use an Overdose Prevention Site (OPS) or Supervised Consumption Site (SCS) whenever possible.
- **Plan ahead.** Services may have reduced or different hours of operation over cold periods and the holidays. Plan and call ahead for supports people might need.
- **Stock up on harm reduction supplies and naloxone.** Many pharmacies remain open and distribute naloxone. Get your replacement kits and do not ration naloxone supply.
- **Do not use multiple substances at the same time.** Leave a couple of hours between using different substances (e.g. alcohol and drugs).
- Use the <u>Lifeguard App</u> if you are using alone.
- Find a site that distributes harm reduction supplies or naloxone.

Supporting people who use drugs:

- Check on friends, neighbours and loved ones. Cold snaps may be associated with increased fatal opioid overdoses.
- Help people access tools to enhance safety. This will look different for different people. Know where to find <u>overdose prevention services</u> and <u>episodic witnessed consumption</u> to help keep people safe. Ask people what they might need to stay safer, acknowledging that there may be barriers in accessing some of the regular places that offer naloxone or harm reduction supplies.
- Know the signs of overdose and how to respond, including giving breaths.
- Call 9-1-1. Anytime someone is not responsive, it is a medical emergency.

It has also been a very busy few days during Christmas for many of us who are reaching out to support those experiencing homelessness in these extremely cold days.

As the city declined to open their closed gym, Peninsula United on 24th Ave has opened it's doors beginning today until Jan 3rd from 7 am to 10 pm to welcome anyone needing to come in from the extreme cold. We are very pleased to have a new non profit- Engaged Communities Canada Society (<u>www.eccsociety.org</u>) providing experienced staff, breakfast, snacks and wonderful hospitality to our guests. Chloe Good from HSABC secured this staffing partner for us and applied for funding from BC Housing on Christmas Day. Today Unite very generously donated the use of one of their vans which the ECC staff will use to transport guests between Mt. Olive and Peninsula United at 7 am and 10 pm. Peace Portal Alliance, PUC and Sources will provide lunch and dinners with many volunteers making deliveries. We are also providing warm clothing and some toiletries donated by the wider community and Hospice. The owner of the Ocean Park Pizza and Pub filled my car with donations from her family and staff. This generosity happens everyday from people at Crescent Gardens to students at Peace Arch Elementary. Options staff continue to work diligently every night to provide a safe refuge for our guests at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church. Mt. Olive has been actively involved in supporting the Shelter with many new

volunteers and the congregation is developing a greater awareness of homelessness on the Peninsula.

Unfortunately there is no shower at Mt. Olive or at Peninsula United. It would be wonderful if the City could help in this way. Most of us shower daily and cannot imagine going a week or two without one let alone a month or two. 12 guests were present early this morning and we envision many more will come. 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Dear Mayor, Council and staff,

Happy New Year!

I'm writing to provide feedback regarding the Jan 10th report by Mr. Eric Stepura regarding a warming Shelter in White Rock.

Thank you for addressing this urgent need in the community once again. I note that the report this year is very similar to last year's report recommending a tent to be used as a warming shelter. The costs and complications were considered to be too great to offer a site indoors last year and similar objections are stated in the report this year.

It is unfortunate that the At Risk and Priority Population Task Force was unable to address this issue over many months, including securing funding sources which many cities have accessed. Note Gibsons, Courtenay and Kamloops links below where these cities support daytime warming Shelters. Staff in these cities could provide information to WR re: funding.

Stephen D'Souza, Executive Director of Homelessness Services Assoc of BC (HSABC) and a member of the At Risk and Priority Population Task Force spoke on

CBC

Jan 6th 2022 advocating that citizens reach out to cities/municipalities to ask them to provide especially daytime sites as funding is available and it is important for them to "step up" to respond to this need.

Chloe Good, also from HSABC and also a participant in the Task Force has also reached out to the city many times with info re: grants.

Tent recommendation:

I do not support any kind of tent for those experiencing homelessness. It will only increase stigma for guests and send a message that they are not worthy of a warm place indoors. It is also important to know that many people experiencing homelessness in White Rock are seniors or others who have frail health What is needed at the basic level is a warm room with warm running water, washroom access and electricity for a kettle to provide a warm drink. Covid spacing restrictions are waved when there is extreme cold. The small entrance foyer was used at Peninsula United Church with a few tables and washroom access. Food and warm clothing was delivered by volunteers.

I feel extremely sad that a heated tent is recommended again.

Info re: Mt. Olive Lutheran EWR Shelter: Opens 10 pm to 7 am.

Thanks to dedicated volunteers reaching out to the community Mt. Olive decided to host the EWR Shelter. Mt. Olive Lutheran has opened their doors more than 60 nights since Oct 27 and has recorded over 900 guest visits to date. The Shelter is supported by Mt. Olive, BC Housing, Options staff, businesses who have offered to help, other churches, many volunteers, others in the community and adjacent neighbourhood.

Info re: Daytime Shelter at Peninsula United: Dec 27- Jan 3 2022

The 1 week daytime Shelter opened in 3 days at Peninsula United following desperate pleas to the City to open a site. Peninsula United Church Council approved the use of the church Christmas Eve day and Chloe Good completed the application to BC Housing on Christmas Day. BC Housing's subsequent approval Boxing Day proved that government can act quickly on a stat holiday in urgent circumstances. I know White Rock City has also rapidly responded in the past to help citizens many times .(ie. Five Corner's fire)

As the Peace Arch News reporter shared in a recent article <u>South Surrey daytime</u> <u>warming centre 'not just a roof over your head' – Peace Arch News</u> a daytime Shelter can be a place where meaningful dialogue can happen, resources can be provided and lives can begin to change. A 24/7 wrap around Shelter is ideal, but if we can partner the two sites as occurred during the short time at Peninsula United due to the generous donation of a van from Uniti, this could be a very positive next step. Businesses including a retirement facility, Sources, restaurants, the police and the general community were enormously supportive of the daytime Shelter. A business owner told a volunteer they are concerned when those without a home are sleeping in their doorways in the daytime so they appreciated that there was now a place people could be warm, safe, and supported with resources. The police were relieved there was a place people could be taken. Lives were literally saved at the Shelter.

It was extremely sad that we had to stop the daytime Shelter as there is a preschool that uses that site.

Thank you for reading my letter.

I continue to volunteer with many others at Mt. Olive and am very grateful for the night Shelter. However a daytime Shelter can provide so much more support and eliminate many other costs such as police service and hospitalization.

Just as it was needed last winter, a daytime Shelter is needed now and I hope you agree with me that the City can and must offer a dignified and humane site for our unhoused and deserving citizens.

I am certain there is room in the inn. Where there is a will, there is a way.

HSABC has made it clear to me that they would like cities to access funding for staffing from grants. Although BC Housing does provide the staffing for all the EWR Shelters in churches etc , I understand that Cities also have access to grants which should be the first approach. I can ask Chloé more about that for you. I am sure BC Housing also could play a role. Staffing numbers depend on the site. At least 2 staff are required for each shift if the Shelter is 7am to 10 pm. Upkar had 2 shifts of staff. If the washrooms are through a hallway etc then another staff member is required to take guests back and forth and ascertain all is OK. Currently Mt Olive has three staff on their shift 10 pm to 7 am due to this reason. Thanks

Tent recommendation:

I do not support any kind of tent for those experiencing homelessness. It will only increase stigma for guests and send a message that they are not worthy of a warm place indoors. It is also important to know that many people experiencing homelessness in White Rock are seniors or others who have frail health What is needed at the basic level is a warm room with warm running water, washroom access and electricity for a kettle to provide a warm drink. Covid spacing restrictions are waved when there is extreme cold. The small entrance foyer was used at Peninsula United Church with a few tables and washroom access. Food and warm clothing was delivered by volunteers.

I feel extremely sad that a heated tent is recommended again.

Info re: Mt. Olive Lutheran EWR Shelter: Opens 10 pm to 7 am.

Thanks to dedicated volunteers reaching out to the community Mt. Olive decided to host the EWR Shelter. Mt. Olive Lutheran has opened their doors more than 60 nights since Oct 27 and has recorded over 900 guest visits to date. The Shelter is supported by Mt. Olive, BC Housing, Options staff, businesses who have offered to help, other churches, many volunteers, others in the community and adjacent neighbourhood.

Info re: Daytime Shelter at Peninsula United: Dec 27- Jan 3 2022

The 1 week daytime Shelter opened in 3 days at Peninsula United following desperate pleas to the City to open a site. Peninsula United Church Council approved the use of the church Christmas Eve day

and Chloe Good completed the application to BC Housing on Christmas Day. BC Housing's subsequent approval Boxing Day proved that government can act quickly on a stat holiday in urgent circumstances. I know White Rock City has also rapidly responded in the past to help citizens many times .(ie. Five Corner's fire) As the Peace Arch News reporter shared in a recent article <u>South</u> <u>Surrey daytime warming centre 'not just a roof over your head' – Peace</u> <u>Arch News</u> a daytime Shelter can be a place where meaningful dialogue can happen, resources can be provided and lives can begin to change.

A 24/7 wrap around Shelter is ideal, but if we can partner the two sites as occurred during the short time at Peninsula United due to the generous donation of a van from Uniti, this could be a very positive next step.

Businesses including a retirement facility, Sources, restaurants, the police and the general community were enormously supportive of the daytime Shelter. A business owner told a volunteer they are concerned when those without a home are sleeping in their doorways in the daytime so they appreciated that there was now a place people could be warm, safe, and supported with resources. The police were relieved there was a place people could be taken. Lives were literally saved at the Shelter.

Where the talk was about staffing and large numbers which all requires work and organizing etc, and my point is we NEEDED something right now - we needed a place to house a few people immediately. We didn't need a huge program on Christmas Eve but rather open a door right away for the few in -10 as it was an emergency and then work on a better option with more time.

So my point in short we didn't need a massive hall which was too late to do, but rather open a room which we could have done in my opinion instead of using theoretical numbers as a barrier to action.

Thank you for your attention to my impromptu plea at Monday's council meeting.

I agree that addressing the needs of unsheltered folks is complex.

Just as other communities have found a way, I believe this council and staff, with community support will also find a strategy, a made in White Rock strategy.

There was mention that only 2 folks were taken by local RCMP to the shelter. That does neglect to consider those who saw posters in key locations, quickly placed there by volunteers, word of mouth and an announcement at the night shelter at Mount Olive church.

As you know, there is support for action by the city. Locally, there are many partners in addressing the needs of the unsheltered in WR/SS. From White Rock these include churches,

businesses and non profits eg Rotary, Sources, the Food Bank and also Fraser Health and the programmes they offer. There are partners from Surrey including churches, businesses and non profits, like Options and Uniti. Of course community members and local RCMP are key in this. Below please find the report prepared by Staff Sgt Kales in May of 2021.

White Rock Homelessness Count and Lived Experience Summary

On April 16 and 17, 2021 the White Rock RCMP conducted a point-in-time count of unsheltered people experiencing homelessness in the city. This count did not include individuals living in shelters, transitions houses, safe houses, or temporarily in other people's homes. With our knowledge of the many secluded spots in White Rock, we went into bushes, parks, around condos, vacant buildings, in parkades, alleys, and around businesses. We located four individuals during these patrols and engaged in conversations to better understand life from their perspective, as well, we discussed barriers to reaching their individual self-actualization. As point-in-time counts having limitations, the officers at the detachment were also canvassed regarding their encounters with people experiencing homelessness over the last two months in White Rock. 24 individuals in total were identified as being unsheltered. Many of our officers have a rapport with these individuals allowing for candid sharing of their experiences.

What we can share:

- Of the 24 individuals, 33% (8) are female and 66% (16) are male. The ethnicity was predominately Caucasian (92%).

- 25% (6) of individuals have a familial history in White Rock or were previously housed in White Rock.

- 75% (18) of individuals are more connected to Surrey or beyond, and normally have an outdoor camp or overnight with inconsistent hosts in Surrey. Many identified White Rock as being the area south of 24th Avenue (16th Ave is the Northern boundary of White Rock).

- The attraction to White Rock included the calm atmosphere, the proximity to the ocean, and the availability of outdoor electrical outlets.

- For many, fentanyl or methamphetamine has been a predominant factor in becoming or remaining unsheltered.

- Some would not take substance use treatment if offered, others felt that there was

not immediate access to treatment when they were at the point of accepting it.

- 29% (7) of the individuals had mental health challenges that the officers believed were so acute that reasonable dialogue was difficult.

- Approximately a third of the individuals avoided shelters due to conflict with other people, or they found it challenging to stay in a structured environment.

Officers in White Rock continue to provide a compassionate service to this marginalized population within the community. Our ongoing participation and communication on this subject, to government and other agencies, is aimed at advancing this complex issue.



You will notice that I appear to be the only one on council who wants a daytime warming shelter throughout the winter months, not just for "extreme weather". I declined to "accept" the report because, as I said in the meeting, it should have had answers to the many outstanding questions raised by council members.

A task force was struck to address housing the "At Risk and Priority Population" for both White Rock and South Surrey. It was disbanded. A homeless shelter is being provided by Mount Olive Lutheran Church that opens at 10 pm and closes at 7 am on nights of extreme weather.

Next winter, Peninsula United Church's new building will be operational and the church part of the building is designed with having an extreme weather shelter there. This is still just a stop-gap to the larger issues facing this population.

I would like to point out that it's not Council that prefers the faith based organizations to provide a solution. It was telling that Staff needed clarification from Council last night for them to look at options for non-city owned spaces. The final motion still left it unclear.



Thanks as always for your message, and sorry for the slow response.

With reluctance I have to agree with you and disagree. Yes it **should** not be the responsibility of the City, but with the Province doing nothing to help, it's yet another matter that falls into our lap. I am miles away from being an activist, but homelessness is an issue that will continue to worsen, and the prices of rent and property are rapidly compounding this. There should be a Provincial response, but it's difficult to do nothing when it's -15 and many other cities ARE doing something. I am obviously opposed to any permanent City sponsored shelter, but in emergencies it's important to have a plan in place (and it really also should be faith based communities helping privately). The latest on this is that we are talking with Surrey about cost sharing, but NOT that 6-digit stuff in the report which are non-starters.

Yep, school is nuts - kids are dropping like flies from COVID, but hey that's the job.



Hello,

I wanted to share some reflections on the proposed installation of a 12' by 60' modular office trailer as a temporary warming centre site at Centennial Park.

We fully support ECCS in mobilizing this resource to meet community needs over the next few months.

Although committed to making this recommendation work, there are a few operational logistics that will require further consideration. HSABC is happy to meet and discuss strategies to align and support programming through this model. I would like to recommend that Upkar, myself, Eric and Mayor Walker meet to discuss the operational considerations below:

Facilities:

It looks as though the expectation is that guests will be sharing a public washroom within the park. This is going to be problematic for sightlines, safety, and staffing considerations. The sales mock-up indicates that the trailer does have a washroom.

- In the report power hook up for the recommended site is estimated at \$2,500. Under the Options/Risks/Alternatives section, utility hookup costs (i.e. power, water, and sewer) are estimated at \$10,000. This means sewer and water hookups make up the balance of \$7,5000 (or \$3,750 per month).
- In addition to guests, staff will also not have access to a washroom onsite.
- Is there an opportunity to hook up those services so the trailer can have running water and a functioning washroom (as illustrated in the sales drawing)?
- If not, is there an opportunity for designated washroom facilities to be closed to the public given the accessibility of other facilities in the park?

Transportation:

During the Arctic Outflow events of December/January, the temporary Warming Centre program at Sunnyside Community Church was supported by resources that transported guests from the daytime site to nighttime shelter services at Mount Olive Lutheran Church.

• Although there may be opportunities at the community level to explore something similar, considerations around and funding for transportation will be an important part of this model's

success.

Activation:

This report outlines a recommendation for a warming shelter that is open for a block of time (January 28 to March 15).

- Winter conditions in this region have been extending into the first week of April so that is something to think about. EWR season timelines have historically been Nov 1 through March 31.
- Offering daytime services without a nighttime shelter could be problematic on days when an Extreme Weather Alert is not activated.
- Security may be an additional resource to consider on nights if/ when the site is not open.
- If moving to a weather driven model, are City staff making the call to open when 'minus zero degree weather' conditions present?

I look forward to exploring opportunities to work collaboratively and feel confident we can find solutions to address these operational considerations.

We are happy to work with community partners to help mobilize this temporary site and meet the immediate needs of those experiencing homelessness, while longer term solutions are developed.

An important and I believe courageous step was taken tonight.

There certainly was a theme of homelessness which is timely.

David Young mentioned to me that support has grown every year since the Coldest Night of the Year started as a small event. That mirrors the need that has been for support for the homeless and at risk of homelessness has been noted by our community. It indicates the commitment folks are willing to make to address this need.

It is encouraging that recently Saltspring Island (population 11,000) has received a commitment from the province through BC Housing for 28 units of supportive housing. In 2015, like us they has an extreme weather shelter. In April 2021 they opened a full time shelter. Now they are to have supportive housing with funds BC Housing from the province's housing plan of \$7 b. that started in 2017 and goes for 10 years. This is action we could also

take to address the housing need continuum.

Also, today (Jan 24/22) on CBC Radio, Matt Galloway's The Current, there was a 30 minutes piece on homelessness. It started with the strategy Medicine Hat has used to functionally end chronic homelessness. Jamie Rogers specifically cited support from mayor and council. Steven Gates, a prof at York U. and ED of Canadian Observatory on Homelessness called for collaboration between federal, provincial and municipal governments. The cost to society of inaction is \$50,000 a year for each homeless person. (McGill U.study)

The federal dollars available for affordable housing right now is unprecedented.


The CEO of the Y Foundation, Helsinki talked of Norway's pledge to have absolute zero homelessness by 2027.

I urge you to listen to this interview.

There is momentum in our city. Eg. from Sources, which you heard tonight, including their new Peer Network programme and we have a new Harm Reduction site. There was a successful Christmas warming centre with a significant number of community partners. The night shelter is at Mount Olive Lutheran, a valued new partner that stepped up to offer their site and support.

We heard Mayor Walker say we must have something more ready for this fall. I think White Rock council took a significant step in that direction tonight.

The role of the security guard would be to ensure damage does not occur to the trailer or surrounding property during the evenings. Unfortunately with a lack of year round homelessness services/ housing options in community – there remains limited places for unsheltered individuals in the area to access when weather responsive programs are not open. That is a larger community need than the EWR and Warming Centre model can fill.

Perhaps Upkar and myself could compile a list of shelters to be distributed to guests when the EWR and Warming Centre are closed. The role of the security guard would likely not bleed into homeless outreach but maybe they could have a resource card/directory and transit tickets they could hand out (if that falls within the mandate of their service contract).

Unfortunately most year round shelters are full so folks may be inclined to stay onsite.

Do you have time for a phone call today?

You had mentioned that to start, the Warming Centre will be open for the next 7 days then will be aligned with openings of the EWS at Mount Olive Lutheran Church. Community is very concerned about the risks associated with these programs operating out of sync, so it would be great to get more clarity around this.

I wanted to circle back to the conversation regarding overnight security for the daytime warming centre.

As a reminder, based on community feedback and experiences with service delivery this season, security has been identified as playing a significant role in monitoring activity around the trailer when the site is closed and supporting program success.

Attached is a quote from the company providing services at the Mount Olive EWR site.

\$27.20 per hour 9 hour shift during site closure- 10pm-7am \$244.80 per shift

February 28 nights March 31 nights 59 shifts total \$244.80 x 59 nights = \$14,443.20

The City has budgeted for nightly operations at \$3,000 based on a solid block of time from Feb 01 through March 15[,] 2022. As a weather driven model there will be some cost savings when the site closes. The cost of security equates to less than 5 operational days.

Is this something the City will consider putting in place to help support the safety of the site, program, and community?



I sent an e-mail to Upkar, the operator of the daytime warming shelter asking him to communicate to the shelter attendees that camping is prohibited in City of White Rock Parks, and that if it continues, it may jeopardize the future operation of the daytime warming shelter. I sent you a copy of the message I sent him.

If these people refuse to comply, we may need to go to the expense of hiring security guards to escort them off of City property at night when the shelter closes. This has been needed at some other shelters. The cost is about \$100.00/day.

I will have an in-person conversation with Upkar today regarding the overnight campers.

Most of the people who attended the shelter yesterday were transported to the Extreme Weather Shelter (EWS) at Mount Olive Lutheran Church last night. There are a few individuals who refuse to stay at Mount Olive's EWS for various personal reasons despite the cold weather.



Yes, we will include usage into the activity update – my understanding is that we had about 20 people using the shelter yesterday.

Here are some comments from Upkar:

We were aware of these instances as they occurred as it was during the morning today (not overnight) and the circumstances were mitigated immediately.

•The individual at the reader sign had stopped for a respite on his way to the bus stop (he was using crutches to walk up the short hill as he has frostbite on both feet). On encountering him staff did help him make his way to the bus stop.


Thanks for letting Council know. Your email has been forwarded to our CAO who is having Bylaw go there now to check it out.

FYI I sent an e-mail to Upkar, the operator of the daytime warming shelter this morning asking him to communicate to the shelter attendees that camping is prohibited in City of White Rock Parks, and that if it continues, it may jeopardize the future operation of the daytime warming shelter.

If these people refuse to comply, we may need to go to the expense of hiring security guards to escort them off of City property at night when the shelter closes each night at 10pm. This has been needed at some other shelters. The cost is about \$100.00/day.

I will have an in-person conversation with Upkar today regarding the overnight campers.

Most of the people who attended the shelter yesterday were transported to the Extreme Weather Shelter (EWS) at Mount Olive Lutheran Church last night. There are a few individuals who refuse to stay at Mount Olive's EWS for various personal reasons despite the cold weather.

Thanks for the Bylaw information Ralph.

The tent provides a covered area outside for the homeless to stand during the day. Many of them smoke. I have asked Upkar to take it down each evening and store it inside the trailer each night.

SECTION 1 INTERPRETATION

Title

1.1 This Bylaw may be cited as the "White Rock Public Health Smoking Protection Bylaw, 2008, No. 1858".

Definitions

1.2 For the purposes of this Bylaw:

"building" or "structure" includes, as the context requires, "premises".

"business" means the carrying on of a commercial or industrial undertaking of any kind or nature or the providing of professional, personal or other services for the purpose of gain or profit.

"City" means The Corporation of the City of White Rock.

"common public area" means an area in a building generally available for common use by the public or by a building's occupants and visitors, including, without restricting the generality of the foregoing, hallways, lobbies, stairways, elevators, restrooms, laundry rooms, amenity areas, cloakrooms, or food service establishments.

"customer service area" means a partially enclosed or unenclosed area, including a balcony, patio, yard or sidewalk, that is part of or connected to or associated with the business or use in a building or premises that includes the service of food or alcoholic drinks to customers or other persons for consumption on site.

"medical health officer" means the Medical Health Officer, appointed for the City under the *Health Act*.

"owner" includes the registered owner or purchaser under an agreement for sale, mortgagee in possession, agent, tenant, and any person in charge or control of a building, premises, land or vehicle.

"post" means the act of keeping continuously on display.

"premises" means a portion of a building in respect of which a person has exclusive possession.

"public transportation" means school bus, public bus or other form of public transportation and includes, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, taxicabs, limousines, or vehicles for hire, but does not include rentals of personal vehicles for private use.

"responsible person" means a person who owns, controls, manages, supervises or operates:

- (a) a business or other use which occupies all or substantially all of a building;
- (b) a business or other use which occupies premises, including a customer service area;
- (c) common public areas;
- (d) a reception area; or
- (e) a vehicle for hire.

"smoke" or "smoking" means the inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying of a lighted cigarette, cigar, pipe or any other lighted smoking equipment burning tobacco, cannabis, or any other weed or substance, and includes the use or holding of an activated e-cigarette, as defined in the *Tobacco and Vapour Products Control Act*, but does not include smoking by actors as part of a stage or theatrical performance or as part of a traditional aboriginal cultural activity. (Bylaw 2265)

"smoke" or "smoking" means the inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying of a lighted eigarette, eigar, pipe or other lighted smoking equipment burning tobacco or any other weed or substance, but does not include smoking by actors as part of a stage or theatrical performance or as part of a traditional aboriginal cultural activity.

Table of Contents

1.3 The table of contents for this Bylaw is for convenient reference only, and is not for use in interpreting or enforcing this Bylaw.

Severability

1.4 A decision by a court of competent jurisdiction that any part of this Bylaw is illegal, void or unenforceable severs that part from this Bylaw and is not to affect the balance of this Bylaw.

Duty of Administration and Enforcement

- 1.5 The intent of this Bylaw is to set standards in the general public interest, and not to impose a duty on the City or its employees to enforce its provisions and:
 - (a) a failure to administer or enforce its provisions or the incomplete or inadequate administration or enforcement of its provisions is not to give rise to a cause of action in favour of any person; and
 - (b) the grant of any approval or permission or issuance of any permit is not a representation, warranty or statement of compliance with the Bylaw and the issuance thereof in error is not to give rise to a cause of action.

SECTION 2 HEALTH REGULATIONS

- 2.1 No person shall smoke:
 - (a) in a building, except in:
 - (i) a dwelling unit as defined in the City of White Rock Zoning bylaw including any balcony or patio accessible therefrom and immediately adjacent thereto, including a dwelling unit in which an owner or occupier also carries on a business,
 - (ii) a hotel or motel room or suite designated for smoking by a responsible person, or
 - (iii) enclosed premises:
 - (A) that are not open to the public,
 - (B) where the only occupants are the owner or owners of the business carried on in the premises;
 - (b) in a vehicle for hire;
 - (c) on public transit, including a school bus, passenger bus or rapid transit;
 - (d) in an enclosed or partially enclosed shelter where people wait to board a vehicle for hire or public transit;
 - (e) in a vehicle when any other occupant of the vehicle is under the age of 16 years;
 - (f) within seven and a half meters measured horizontally from any door or window that opens or any air intake;
 - (g) in a customer services area;
 - (h) within seven and a half meters of the perimeter of a customer service area but this subsection does not apply to smoking in a dwelling unit as defined in subsection 2.1(a)(i) herein; or
 - (i) in any outdoor gathering place under the jurisdiction of the City of White Rock including parks, sports fields, playgrounds, the promenade, the pier and the beach.

Enforcement of ban on smoking

2.2 Except as permitted by section 2.1, a responsible person must not suffer or allow a person to smoke in any of the areas specified in section 2.1(a) through (i).

Signs banning smoking

- 2.3 A responsible person must display or ensure the display of a sign at all times:
 - (a) at each entrance to a building or customer service area or to premises or in a vehicle for hire where section 2.1 prohibits smoking, stating:

"THIS IS A SMOKE FREE ENVIRONMENT - NO SMOKING"

and the words:

"MAXIMUM FINE \$2,000.00"

on each exterior wall of a building where section 2.1 prohibits smoking, stating:

"SMOKING IS PROHIBITED WITHIN 7.5 METRES OF OPENINGS INTO THIS BUILDING INCLUDING DOORS AND WINDOWS THAT OPEN AND ANY AIR INTAKE"

Sign requirements

- 2.4 All signs referred to in section 2.3 must:
 - (a) display the international symbol to designate "No Smoking" or, in areas where smoking is permissible, the international symbol to designate "Smoking Permitted" which symbol must occupy at least 25% of the size of the sign;
 - (b) consist of at least two contrasting colours, except that if the lettering is on a clear panel, then the lettering must contrast to the colour of the background;
 - (c) be at least 30 cm by 15 cm;
 - (d) be clearly visible;
 - (e) consist of lettering, whether upper case or lower case, that is not less than the following heights based upon the following maximum viewing distances in direct line of sight:

Viewing Distance	Letter Height
Up to 3 m	1 cm
Up to 6 m	2 cm
Up to 12 m	4 cm

(f) included in the text at the bottom of each sign:

"White Rock Public Health Smoking Protection Bylaw, 2008, No. 1858" in letters not less than 1 cm in height for signs with letter size of 2 cm and not less than 0.25 cm of the height of the letter on all other sizes of letters."

2.5 Notwithstanding the fact that the symbol in section 2.4 is a cigarette, it shall be deemed to include a lighted cigar, pipe or other lighted smoking equipment burning tobacco, cannabis or any other weed or substance, or an activated e-cigarette as defined in the *Tobacco and Vapour Products Control Act.* (Bylaw 2265)

Notwithstanding the fact that the symbol in section 2.4 is a cigarette, it shall be deemed to include a lighted eigar, pipe or other lighted smoking equipment burning tobacco or any other weed or substance.

Conditions of signs

2.6 A person must not remove, alter, conceal, deface or destroy any sign required under this Bylaw or cause any sign required under this Bylaw to be removed, altered, concealed, defaced or destroyed.

SECTION 3 OFFENCES AND PENALTIES AND ENFORCEMENT

Notice of Violation

- 3.1 A building official or a bylaw enforcement officer, may give notice to any person ordering or directing that person to:
 - (a) discontinue or refrain from proceeding with any work or using or occupying any land or building or doing anything that contravenes this Bylaw; or
 - (b) carry out any work or do anything to bring any land or building into conformity with this Bylaw;

within the time specified in such notice.

Service of Notice

- 3.2 A building official or a bylaw enforcement officer, may serve a notice under this Bylaw:
 - (a) by sending it by registered post to an owner who is the addressee of the notice at the address of the owner shown on the real property assessment roll prepared pursuant to the *Assessment Act*;
 - (b) by handing it to the person who is the addressee of the notice; or
 - (c) if the notice refers to real property, by posting it on the real property.

Offences under Bylaw

- 3.3 A person who:
 - (a) violates any provision of this Bylaw or does any act or thing which violates any provision of this Bylaw or allows any other person to do any act or thing which violates any provision of this Bylaw;
 - (b) neglects to do or refrains from doing anything required to be done by any provision of this Bylaw; or

(c) fails to comply or allows any other person to fail to comply, with an order, direction, or notice given under any provision of this Bylaw;

is guilty of an offence against this Bylaw and liable to the penalties imposed under sections 3.4 and 3.5 of this Bylaw. A person may be subject to the penalties imposed under section 3.3(a) or (b) above regardless of whether the person has been given a prior notice under section 3.1.

Continuing Offence

3.4 Each day that a violation of this Bylaw continues constitutes a separate offence.

Fines for Offence

3.5 Every person who commits an offence against of this Bylaw is punishable on conviction by a fine of not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$2000.00.

SECTION 4 REPEAL AND ENACTMENT

4.1 This Bylaw repeals White Rock Smoking Regulation Bylaw, 1996, No. 1502, as amended.

Force and Effect

4.2 This Bylaw comes into force and takes effect on November 1, 2008 except section 2.1(g) and (h) which are to come into force and take effect on January 1, 2009.

FYI I sent an e-mail to Upkar, the operator of the daytime warming shelter this morning asking him to communicate to the shelter attendees that camping is prohibited in City of White Rock Parks, and that if it continues, it may jeopardize the future operation of the daytime warming shelter.

If these people refuse to comply, we may need to go to the expense of hiring security guards to escort them off of City property at night when the shelter closes each night at 10pm. This has been needed at some other shelters. The cost is about \$100.00/day.

I will have an in-person conversation with Upkar today regarding the overnight campers.

Most of the people who attended the shelter yesterday were transported to the Extreme Weather Shelter (EWS) at Mount Olive Lutheran Church last night. There are a few individuals who refuse to stay at Mount Olive's EWS for various personal reasons despite the cold weather.

Thanks for the Bylaw information Ralph.

The tent provides a covered area outside for the homeless to stand during the day. Many of them smoke. I have asked Upkar to take it down each evening and store it inside the trailer each night.

I just had a conversation with Upkar Singh Tatlay (<u>upkar@eccsociety.org</u>) the operator of the daytime warming shelter at Centennial Park regarding the importance of informing the shelter visitors that they cannot be camping overnight in White Rock Parks. He agreed to talk to them.

Upkar informed me that the people that were hanging out in Centennial Park before the warming shelter opened at 7am had been shuttled here between 6:30am and 7am because the Mount Olive Extreme Weather Shelter insist that everyone is out of their building before 7am. He doubts that any of these people camped overnight in Centennial Park last night.

I will continue to monitor the daily use of the warming shelter and communicate with Upkar whenever incidents occur. Yesterday there were 16 people that had signed in at the warming shelter. So far today, there have been 19 people.


Hello Eric,

I have asked the Nutech staff to call **Upkar Singh Patlay 778-223-6987** from the Engaged Communities Canada Society for an escort to check for hazards prior to each service at Centennial Ball Diamond Comfort Station. The agreement is for these washrooms to be serviced every 3-4 hours between 8:00 am and 6:00 pm 7 days a week.

Their current rate for services is \$25.49 / hour Below is their pricing on supplies.

I have asked Nutech to forward you the invoices for supplies for both the mobile lavatory as well as Centennial Ball Diamond Comfort Stations beginning February 1, 2022. As well as invoice for services for Centennial Ball Diamond Comfort Station as of February 1, 2022.

Repairs for potential vandalism would be an extra cost as well.

Daytime Warming Shelter Budget

Facility Costs:

The cost for rental and hookup of a modular trailer, with added washroom cleaning is as follows:

- Rental, delivery, setup and takedown of trailer and taxes \$8,040
 power hookup, cable and removal at the end of March \$5,000
 Daily janitorial cleaning of washrooms at Centennial Park by contractor \$6,000
 Janitorial supplies for washrooms used by shelter visitors and ECCS staff \$ 960
 Security services \$1,000
 - Total installation/rental/cleaning cost \$21,000
- Note that there is a security deposit of \$1,860 on the trailer (Refundable) which has already been paid.

Warming Shelter Operating Costs (Contracted Service)

Staff have received a quote of \$3,000/day from the Engaged Communities of Canada Society (ECCS) for operating a warming shelter for up to 30 people experiencing homelessness in South Surrey and White Rock.

Due to the need to provide 4 days of advance notice for a minimum 7 day commitment, staff are estimating services for a block of time (February 01 to March 15, 2022). Therefore the estimated operating cost for the warming shelter for up to 30 people/day from February 01 to March 15, 2022 is estimated at \$129,000. The breakdown is as follows: 43 days x 3,000/day = 129,000.

Note that there may be some dates between February 01 and March 15, 2022 that the shelter will not be operated due to above zero degree temperatures, therefore, these contracted operating costs may be less than the \$129,000. However, it is also possible that there may be a few dates that the shelter needs to be open between March 15 and 31, 2022 due to extreme weather. For the purposes of this budget, I have used 43 days as the maximum number of dates that the shelter will be operated.

Total Warming Shelter Costs

The total combined facility costs and operating costs, to provide and operate a warming shelter for people experiencing homelessness from January 28, 2022 to March 15, 2022 is **\$160,000**.

City of Surrey Contribution

Note that the City of Surrey has provided a letter stating that they are prepared to contribute 50% of the costs to provide and operate the daytime warming shelter **up to \$80,000**. Therefore the City of White Rock's maximum contribution is \$80,000.



I will be speaking with Upkar Singh Tatlay of Engaged Communities of Canada Society, the coordinator of the daytime warming shelter again today at 11:30am to have him speak to the shelter visitors that they cannot camp overnight in the entrance to our arena, in Centennial Park and they are not allowed in our recreation facilities unless they are there to attend programs.

Unfortunately, legally we cannot prevent them from staying in our park overnight. A recent Human Rights court case ruled that homeless people are allowed to camp overnight on government property, including municipal parks, but must vacate the property by 8am.

I will be speaking to the Curling Club manager about returning to locking the front door at CAL to prevent homeless people from going in there and messing washrooms etc.

Thanks for the heads up.

I sent an e-mail to Upkar, the operator of the daytime warming shelter asking him to communicate to the shelter attendees that camping is prohibited in City of White Rock Parks, and that if it continues, it may jeopardize the future operation of the daytime warming shelter.

If these people refuse to comply, we may need to go to the expense of hiring security guards to escort them off of City property at night when the shelter closes.

I will have an in-person conversation with Upkar today regarding the overnight campers.

Most of the people who attended the shelter yesterday were transported to the Extreme Weather Shelter (EWS) at Mount Olive Lutheran Church last night. There are a few individuals who refuse to stay at Mount Olive's EWS for various personal reasons despite the cold weather.

8. Update from the Fire Chief on COVID-19

Submitted by White Rock Fire Rescue

Summary: On Thursday, B.C. reported another 13 COVID-19-related deaths. Hospitalized patients continue to show signs of levelling off; health officials reported 985 people in hospital, down three overnight, 145 of those in critical or intensive care, which represents an overnight increase of nine.

There has been a 19 percent decrease in new cases reported. Limitations on testing however have rendered B.C.'s case totals an inaccurate measure of how widely the virus has actually spread. There have been 2,656 deaths reported since the start of the pandemic.

Eighty-one-and-a-half per cent of British Columbians have had two shots while 42.8 per cent has had three. Fully-vaccinated people accounted for 74.8 per cent of new cases over the past week, and 68.9 per cent of hospitalizations over the past two weeks.

Unvaccinated people continued to be at significantly higher risk of severe outcomes from COVID: per 100,000 population, there were 87.5 unvaccinated people in hospital compared to 19.2 fully-vaccinated people over the past two weeks.

 Note that there is a security deposit of \$1,860 on the trailer (Refundable) which has already been paid.

Warming Shelter Operating Costs (Contracted Service)

Staff have received a quote of \$3,000/day from the Engaged Communities of Canada Society (ECCS) for operating a warming shelter for up to 30 people experiencing homelessness in South Surrey and White Rock.

Due to the need to provide 4 days of advance notice for a minimum 7 day commitment, staff are estimating services for a block of time (February 01 to March 18, 2022). Therefore the estimated operating cost for the warming shelter for up to 30 people/day from February 01 to March 18, 2022 is estimated at \$138,000. The breakdown is as follows: 46 days x \$3,000/day = \$138,000.

Note that there may be some dates between February 01 and March 18, 2022 that the shelter will not be operated due to above zero degree temperatures, therefore, these contracted operating costs may be less than the \$138,000. However, it is also possible that there may be a few dates that the shelter needs to be open between March 18 and 31, 2022 due to extreme weather. For the purposes of this budget, I have used 46 days as the maximum number of dates that the shelter will be operated.

Total Warming Shelter Costs

The total combined facility costs and operating costs, to provide and operate a warming shelter for people experiencing homelessness from February 01, 2022 to March 18, 2022 is **\$160,000**.

City of Surrey Contribution

Note that the City of Surrey has provided a letter stating that they are prepared to contribute 50% of the costs to provide and operate the daytime warming shelter up to \$80,000. Therefore the City of White Rock's maximum contribution is \$80,000.

The city pays for the modem (and the monthly plan), and it can then be used every winter for this purpose. If you chose the latter, you'd need to find the funds to cover the costs. It is an out-of-the-box solution; no IT skills required.

He told us that in future his request for a 4 day notice and 7 day activation of the Daytime Shelter would not continue as City Council had approved a motion that both sites open and close at the same time. So as a result our volunteers prepared a joint poster for both sites/opening/closing at the same time.

I am now confused as the daytime Shelter is open but the nighttime site is closed. I understand it will close today at 10 pm.

Can you share the plan for future openings/closings for our 3 volunteers who put up posters.

He said that all shelter visitors left the site by 10pm and all were given an "emergency pack" consisting of food and other items to help them get through the night.

He had one of his staff remain at the shelter until 5am this morning to see if any of the people returned to the shelter. One person did. They were given an emergency pack and they left the property willingly.

Today I received an order stating that the Extreme Weather Shelters will be reactivated from Thursday through Monday of next week due to expected low temperatures. 

Here is the response from staff working at the site:

We were aware of these instances as they occurred as it was during the morning today (not overnight) and the circumstances were mitigated immediately.

•The individual at the reader sign had stopped for a respite on his way to the bus stop (he was using crutches to walk up the short hill as he has frostbite on both feet). On encountering him staff did help him make his way to the bus stop.

•The people who were gathered under the tent were using substances and when one had

collapsed he was brought indoors as the group was being monitored.

•There was nobody sleeping under the tent overnight.

•Will make sure staff remove the tent every evening.

•Security may be a unnecessary for the site and I can share some learned insights for that when we meet later.

Repeating again that it will be closed most of the time and the entire building will be gone in about a month as we head into Spring.

As S.Surrey/White Rock develops (and Surrey voted for the tower filled Semiahmoo Town Center plan) these issues with homelessness will significantly increase uptown regardless if we have a temporary shelter or not. Some in the community and even on this council want to create a permanent facility. Some action has to be taken to get ahead. Is this going to help? We are going to see. If it is an absolutely gong show then it won't be repeated next year. I'm going to head down there this week again to see for myself. I know the Mayor is as well.



Here is the response from staff working at the site:

We were aware of these instances as they occurred as it was during the morning today (not overnight) and the circumstances were mitigated immediately.

•The individual at the reader sign had stopped for a respite on his way to the bus stop (he was using crutches to walk up the short hill as he has frostbite on both feet). On encountering him staff did help him make his way to the bus stop.

•The people who were gathered under the tent were using substances and when one had collapsed he was brought indoors as the group was being monitored.

•There was nobody sleeping under the tent overnight.

• Will make sure staff remove the tent every evening.

•Security may be a unnecessary for the site and I can share some learned insights for that when we meet later.

Repeating again that it will be closed most of the time and the entire building will be gone in about a month as we head into Spring.

As S.Surrey/White Rock develops (and Surrey voted for the tower filled Semiahmoo Town Center plan) these issues with homelessness will significantly increase uptown regardless if we have a temporary shelter or not. Some in the community and even on this council want to create a permanent facility. Some action has to be taken to get ahead. Is this going to help? We are going to see. If it is an absolutely gong show then it won't be repeated next year. I'm going to head down there this week again to see for myself. I know the Mayor is as well.



 Note that there is a security deposit of \$1,860 on the trailer (Refundable) which has already been paid.

Warming Shelter Operating Costs (Contracted Service)

Staff have received a quote of \$3,000/day from the Engaged Communities of Canada Society (ECCS) for operating a warming shelter for up to 30 people experiencing homelessness in South Surrey and White Rock.

Due to the need to provide 4 days of advance notice for a minimum 7 day commitment, staff are estimating services for a block of time (February 01 to March 18, 2022). Therefore the estimated operating cost for the warming shelter for up to 30 people/day from February 01 to March 18, 2022 is estimated at \$138,000. The breakdown is as follows: 46 days x \$3,000/day = \$138,000.

Note that there may be some dates between February 01 and March 18, 2022 that the shelter will not be operated due to above zero degree temperatures, therefore, these contracted operating costs may be less than the \$138,000. However, it is also possible that there may be a few dates that the shelter needs to be open between March 18 and 31, 2022 due to extreme weather. For the purposes of this budget, I have used 46 days as the maximum number of dates that the shelter will be operated.

Total Warming Shelter Costs

The total combined facility costs and operating costs, to provide and operate a warming shelter for people experiencing homelessness from February 01, 2022 to March 18, 2022 is \$160,000.

City of Surrey Contribution

Note that the City of Surrey has provided a letter stating that they are prepared to contribute 50% of the costs to provide and operate the daytime warming shelter up to \$80,000. Therefore the City of White Rock's maximum contribution is \$80,000.

If it only includes GST then the daily cost to the city would be \$2,857. Either way it means another change to the document you sent with the updated budget.

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Hi Eric/G,

I just wanted to give you an update on some of the officers experiences at the warming centre in attempting to partner, be compassionate, and de-stigmatize the police. Within some social organizations there can be workers that have a view of the police that is not always productive or accurate. I have encouraged the WR officers to visit the centre as a method of engaging with vulnerable individuals on neutral ground where we are not there due to a complaint. The staff at the centre are generally nice (and we appreciate their service there), but are reluctant or refuse to allow the officers to go in or to engage in some sort of proactive meet & greet or a casual 'hello' with the users of the place. In my view, it is not a productive way to build relationships knowing that in the community the police may be the ones finding them on a cold night and taking them to a shelter, buying them a coffee, or showing up to a call where having some pre-built rapport with them would be helpful. There are also cases where we have missing persons or wellness check calls that lead us to the centre, where the staff sometimes take our description of the individual and check for themselves...this is usually not sufficient for our needs. The officers are aware not to attend to the centre to randomly check for people with warrants etc...they fully recognize that their purpose there is to decrease any stigma and to build a rapport. Although not all people that use a warming shelter interact with the police, the unfortunate reality is they are at a higher likelihood due to their circumstance.

Also, there have been times when officers have witnessed people outside doing drugs and engaged in casual conversations with them regarding this. Although the staff state they are monitoring from inside the building, there have been some instances where people have been under blankets or out of view of the trailer, or even further away outside CAL. This is not a comment of the use of substances, but a recommendation that the warming centre have the capacity for supervised

substance use to further assist in preventing overdoses and providing supportive services. I recognize this is outside the scope of the warming centres intent, however it appears to be a reality of having this type of centre.

We do appreciate the staff at the centre, but I would have loved to seen this centre operate in a more inclusive and non-judgement manner toward the police.

This is not a comment of the use of substances, but a recommendation that the warming centre have the capacity for supervised substance use to further assist in preventing overdoses and providing supportive services. I recognize this is outside the scope of the warming centres intent, however it appears to be a reality of having this type of centre.

We do appreciate the staff at the centre, but I would have loved to seen this centre operate in a more inclusive and non-judgement manner toward the police.

I have estimated the cost to install a 7 KW standby generator at with a manual transfer switch at the temporary warming shelter. The manual switch method is the least expensive method for providing a back up source of power in the event of a power failure. The cost to modify the existing service supply will be \$2,556.00 plus the rental cost of for generator of \$120 per day or \$1,000.00 per month, in addition to the original cost of \$3,959.00 to provide power to the shelter. There is also a discounting and returning the main distribution to its original state cost of \$810.00 My concern is that the staff on site would be responsible for the starting of the generator and transferring the power over then re transferring the back to hydro power and shutting down the

generator. Normally these operations are done automatically with auto transfer switch. The cost and control setup for auto-transferring would be a considerable amount higher than the manual cost. We would be available to be on a call out standby bases to do this operation if you chose to go this route.

unsupervised drug use away from the warming shelter? The warming shelter guests are free to travel to and from the warming shelter. Shelter staff cannot supervise their movement once they are away from the warming shelter area. Supervised drug use does occur in the tent located beside the warming shelter in an effort to keep drug use contained.

nearby camping/loitering? This is unknown. There are a few individuals that attend the shelter that have their possessions in shopping carts and refuse to stay overnight at Mount Olive. Where they camp overnight is unknown at this time. Warming shelter guests have been told not to loiter around Centennial Arena or CAL buildings or the Generations Playground.

I did a long walk around on Friday (community gardens, the top of the ravine, out to the playground) I didn't see anything of note There were a couple of homeless in the tent by the shelter, but that is a designated area I didn't see any other tents, homeless, or drug material (not saying they are not there, just I didn't see them)

I spoke with the RCMP too They say they have not responded to any calls regarding ODs (though they normally wouldn't) and they have not seen an increase in calls to the Park compared to normal nor any staff resources. In fact they say it helps as it has allowed a person or two to be moved from a residential neighbourhood. They have stepped up patrols to the area just in case but as said no increase in issues. Hi Eric/G,

I just wanted to give you an update on some of the officers experiences at the warming centre in attempting to partner, be compassionate, and de-stigmatize the police. Within some social organizations there can be workers that have a view of the police that is not always productive or accurate. I have encouraged the WR officers to visit the centre as a method of engaging with vulnerable individuals on neutral ground where we are not there due to a complaint. The staff at the centre are generally nice (and we appreciate their service there), but are reluctant or refuse to allow the officers to go in or to engage in some sort of proactive meet & greet or a casual 'hello' with the users of the place. In my view, it is not a productive way to build relationships knowing that in the community the police may be the ones finding them on a cold night and taking them to a shelter, buying them a coffee, or showing up to a call where having some pre-built rapport with them would be helpful. There are also cases where we have missing persons or wellness check calls that lead us to the centre, where the staff sometimes take our description of the individual and check for themselves...this is usually not sufficient for our needs. The officers are aware not to attend to the centre to randomly check for people with warrants etc...they fully recognize that their purpose there is to decrease any stigma and to build a rapport. Although not all people that use a warming shelter interact with the police, the unfortunate reality is they are at a higher likelihood due to their circumstance.

Also, there have been times when officers have witnessed people outside doing drugs and engaged in casual conversations with them regarding this. Although the staff state they are monitoring from inside the building, there have been some instances where people have been under blankets or out of view of the trailer, or even further away outside CAL. This is not a comment of the use of substances, but a recommendation that the warming centre have the capacity for supervised substance use to further assist in preventing overdoses and providing supportive services. I recognize this is outside the scope of the warming centres intent, however it appears to be a reality of having this type of centre.

We do appreciate the staff at the centre, but I would have loved to seen this centre operate in a more inclusive and non-judgement manner toward the police.

COVID-19 Restart Funding for Local Governments Strengthening Communities' Services 2022 Program & Application Guide

1. Introduction

The COVID-19 pandemic has led to an increase in the visibility of unsheltered homelessness in many communities, and related community health and safety challenges.¹ Many local governments and Treaty First Nations, despite already experiencing pressures on revenues and staff capacity, have responded to these challenges with a variety of services, infrastructure, and coordination with health authorities and social sector service providers.

Some of society's most vulnerable members face challenges that have worsened in the context of COVID-19. This includes groups that are more likely to experience homelessness and are more vulnerable to the health and safety risks associated with living unsheltered, such as Indigenous People, women, and gender diverse people. People who lack adequate housing are more likely to suffer from a range of health challenges – including mental health issues, substance abuse issues, and extreme weather impacts – and are highly vulnerable to COVID-19.

The Government of Canada and the Province of British Columbia provided \$540 million in shared funding to local governments under the Safe Restart Agreement to manage the impacts of the global COVID-19 pandemic. These investments have helped to protect public health and safety, prepare for potential future waves of the virus, and further support the safe reopening of economies.

Strengthening Communities' Services Program

Within the Safe Restart funding, \$100 million was allocated for the Strengthening Communities' Services Program. The initial intake of the Strengthening Communities' Services Program saw approximately \$80 million delivered to local governments. The remaining funds are now available through the 2022 intake.

The intent of the Strengthening Communities' Services Program is to support unsheltered homeless populations and address related community impacts through an application-based program. The goal is to support local governments and Treaty First Nations that wish to take action, understanding that this will complement parallel provincial efforts. This program is meant to bridge the period between the COVID-19 outbreak and the post-COVID recovery period. The funding is being administered by UBCM on behalf of the Province and the Government of Canada.

Intended Outcomes

The intended outcomes of the Strengthening Communities' Services program are to assist local governments and Treaty First Nations with:

- Improved health and safety of unsheltered homeless people living in public or private spaces, including reduced risk of COVID-19 or other disease transmission;
- Reduced community concerns about public health and safety in neighbourhoods where unsheltered homeless populations are seeking temporary shelter and services;

¹ For the purpose of Strengthening Communities' Services funding, unsheltered homelessness refers to people who lack housing, and includes people living in public or private spaces without consent (parks, sidewalks, vacant buildings, lots, etc.) and people living in places not intended for long-term human habitation (vehicles, garages, makeshift shelters, shacks or tents, etc.).



- Improved coordination among eligible applicants and health/social service providers, Indigenous organizations and others working on housing, homelessness and service provision; and;
- Increased capacity of eligible applicants to work with homeless persons and Indigenous
 organizations towards culturally safe and trauma-informed responses.

2. Eligible Applicants

All local governments (municipalities, regional districts, and the Islands Trust) and Treaty First Nations (as defined by the *Interpretation Act*) in BC are eligible to apply.

Eligible applicants can submit one application per intake, including regional applications or participation as a partnering applicant in a regional application. Please note that higher application review scores may be awarded to applicants that were not funded under the 2021 intake.

3. Funding Guidelines

The Strengthening Communities' Services Program can contribute up to 100% of the cost of eligible activities.

It is recommended that eligible applicants follow the Funding Guidelines below. Funding permitting, applications for projects that exceed the Funding Guidelines may be considered for funding provided that applicants are able to demonstrate evidence of need in the community and provide a rationale for the request. If the total funding request exceeds the available funding, applicants that have requested additional funds may be asked to reduce their funding request.

In order to ensure transparency and accountability in the expenditure of public funds, all other financial contributions for eligible portions of the project must be declared and, depending on the total value, may decrease the value of the grant. This includes any other grant funding and any revenue that is generated from activities that are funded by the Strengthening Communities' Services Program.

4. Eligible Projects

To be eligible for funding, applications must demonstrate that proposed activities meet one or more of the intended outcomes of the program (see Section 1), and all of the following:

- Demonstrate evidence of need in the community (e.g. unsheltered homeless population estimates, housing needs report, community concerns about public health and safety) and provide a rationale for how these issues have been exacerbated by COVID-19;
- Provide solutions that address increased urgent and immediate needs related to unsheltered homelessness and do not create ongoing long-term financial obligations that will not be supported by the applicant;

- Include new activities or a clearly phased expansion of existing activities and:
 - For applicants that have not been previously funded, with costs incurred after September 17, 2020;
 - For applicants that were previously funded, with costs incurred from the date the application is submitted.
- Be capable of completion by the applicant within one year of the date of grant approval.

Applicants must choose to apply as a single applicant (i.e. an individual local government as identified in Section 2) or as part of a regional project.

Regional Projects

Funding requests from two or more eligible applicants for regional projects may be submitted as a single application for eligible collaborative projects. In this case, the maximum funding available would be based on the combined funding guidelines of each of the eligible applicants included in the application. It is expected that regional projects will demonstrate cost-efficiencies in the total grant request.

The primary applicant submitting the application for a regional project is required to submit a resolution as outlined in Section 7 of this guide. Each partnering applicant is required to submit a resolution that clearly states their approval for the primary applicant to apply for, receive, and manage the grant funding on their behalf.

5. Requirements for Funding

As part of the approval agreement, approved projects must meet the following requirements for funding:

- Any in-person activities, meetings, or events meet public health guidance in relation to COVID-19.
- Activities must comply with all applicable privacy legislation under the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* in relation to the collection, use, or disclosure of personal information while conducting funded activities. Personal information is any recorded information about an identifiable individual other than their business contact information. This includes information that can be used to identify an individual through association or inference.

In addition, as part of both the development of the application package and the delivery of the approved project, local governments are encouraged to engage with local First Nations and Indigenous organizations. Engagement by local governments both locally and regionally can help build relationships with First Nations, benefit both communities and enhance reconciliation. More information on engagement best practices is available <u>here</u>.

6. Eligible & Ineligible Costs & Activities

Eligible costs are direct costs that are approved for funding, properly and reasonably incurred, and paid by the applicant to carry out eligible activities. For applicants that have not been previously funded, eligible costs can be incurred after September 17, 2020 to the date of submission of the final report. For applicants that were previously funded, eligible costs can be incurred from the date the application is submitted to the date of submission of the final report.

Table 2 identifies examples of activities that are eligible for funding. Other activities that support the intent of the program may be considered for funding. Eligible activities must be cost-effective.

Table 2: Activities Eligible for Funding (including but not limited to)

1. Improved health and safety of unsheltered homeless people living in public or private spaces, including reduced risk of COVID-19 or other disease transmission

Note: Costs related to minor renovations or minor improvements are limited to no more than 25% of the total grant request

- Temporarily increasing emergency shelter capacity, availability, and services, including:
 - Expansion of existing shelters (e.g. more beds, staff, hours, and shelter-based services);
 - Creation of new temporary shelter spaces, including minor renovations or minor improvements that are directly related to eligible service provision, within:
 - Buildings or land owned by the eligible applicant; or
 - Buildings or land owned by legally incorporated societies, non-profit groups or community associations
 - Adherence to COVID-19 public health regulations (e.g. shelter capacity reductions, extra cleaning staff, physical distancing, rental of motel rooms to allow infected individuals to safely isolate if directed to do so by a public health official).
- Providing other temporary options or enhancements for unsheltered homeless populations (e.g. temporary structures such as tents, platforms, fire retardant tarps, warming tents).
- Providing temporary, incremental services (including basic supplies and equipment) that are specifically related to supporting unsheltered homeless populations such as:

0	Food, water and cooking supplies;	0	Security;
0	Bathroom facilities, showers, laundry;	0	First aid;
0	Cleaning and waste management;	0	Fire safety; and
0	Harm reduction;	0	Outreach teams to connect people to resources and support programs.

2. Reduced community concerns about public health and safety in neighbourhoods where unsheltered homeless populations are seeking temporary shelter

- Fostering positive dialogue between unsheltered homeless people, bylaw and protective services, and neighbourhoods or community members (e.g. liaison program with bylaw enforcement).
- Promoting understanding and cooperation through peer-based and/or neighbourhood participatory activities for site cleaning, security, communications, etc.
- Providing programs or services that offer storage or security for belongings of unsheltered homeless populations.
- Funding incremental expenditures relating to protective services and bylaw enforcement.
- Participating in, supporting or coordinating community engagement strategies (e.g. neighbourhood outreach, public education materials, participatory dialogues).

3. Improved coordination among eligible applicants and health/social service providers, Indigenous organizations and others working on housing, homelessness and service provision

- Partnering with Indigenous leadership, communities and organizations.
- Participating in, supporting or coordinating cross-jurisdictional working groups and service teams related to housing, homelessness, and service provision.
- Participating in, supporting or coordinating joint communications programs with health authorities.
- Collaborating with health authorities and non-profit service providers on supporting harm reduction services and initiatives to connect people to health services.
- Liaising with public health officials on extreme weather events, environmental safety, infection prevention and control and overdose prevention focusing on unsheltered homeless populations.
- Collaborating with local fire commissioners to increase fire safety.
- Participating in, supporting or coordinating peer-based support services including development of peer teams.
- 4. Increased capacity of eligible applicants to work with homeless persons and Indigenous organizations towards culturally safe and trauma-informed responses
 - Training for elected officials, program administration and front-line staff, bylaw and protective services staff, and peers supporting unsheltered homeless populations, addressing topics such as:
 - Trauma: causes, effects, and trauma-informed approaches;
 - Crisis de-escalation;
 - o Awareness of Housing First and harm reduction principles;
 - The distinct needs and barriers of Indigenous Peoples at risk of homelessness, as well as Indigenous cultural safety and cultural humility training; and
 - The distinct needs and barriers of groups at higher risk of homelessness, including youth, women at risk of violence, LGBTQ2S+, and people with disabilities (including mental illness, brain injury and cognitive impairments).

Additional Eligible Costs & Activities

In addition to the activities identified in Table 2, the following expenditures are also eligible provided they relate directly to eligible activities:

- Honoraria for community members with lived experience of unsheltered homelessness that are participants in funded activities
- Incremental applicant staff and administration costs (i.e. creating a new position or adding new responsibilities to an existing position);
- Consultant or other third-party contract costs relating to eligible service provision;
- Public information and engagement costs;
- Temporary lease/rental costs related to the delivery of eligible activities; and
- Minor renovations and improvements directly related to eligible service provision, limited to buildings or land owned by the eligible applicant and/or buildings or land owned by legally incorporated societies, non-profit groups or community associations and no more than 25% of the total grant request.

Ineligible Costs & Activities

Any activity that is not outlined in Table 2 or the 'Additional Eligible Costs & Activities' section is not eligible for grant funding. This includes:

- Development of funding application package;
- Development of architectural, engineering, or other design drawings for the construction or renovation of facilities;
- Routine or ongoing operating and/or planning costs or activities that are not incremental to the project;
- Purchase of software, software licences, service subscriptions, or membership fees;
- Legal, audit, or interest fees or fees to incorporate a society;
- Fundraising, lobbying, or sponsorship campaigns;
- Project-related fees payable to the eligible applicant(s) (e.g. permit fees, DCCs, etc.);
- Purchase of promotional items, door/raffle prizes, give-away items, and/or gifts for community members;
- Major capital improvements to existing facilities and/or construction of new, permanent facilities;
- Long-term, permanent capital investments including the purchase of land, buildings, vehicles (including Recreational Vehicles or trailers), mobile units (such as mobile washroom or shower units) and/or shelter units (such as tiny homes, storage containers, etc.);
- Park and public space clean up, remediation, fencing and/or repair after an area is no longer used by people experiencing unsheltered homelessness.

7. Application Requirements & Process

Application Deadline

The application deadline is <u>April 22, 2022</u>. Applicants will be advised of the status of their application within 90 days of the application deadline.

Required Application Contents

All applicants are required to submit an electronic copy of the complete application, including:

- Completed Application Form with all required attachments;
- Detailed budget that indicates the proposed expenditures from Strengthening Communities' Services program funding and other sources (if applicable) and that aligns with the proposed activities outlined in the Application Form. Although additional funding or support is not required, any other grant funding or in-kind contributions must be identified;
- Council, Board, Local Trust Committee or Treaty First Nation resolution, indicating support for the current proposed activities and willingness to provide overall grant management;
- <u>For regional projects</u>: Council, Board, Local Trust Committee, Treaty First Nation resolution from each partnering applicant that clearly states approval for the primary applicant to <u>apply for</u>, <u>receive</u>, and manage the grant funding on their behalf;
- <u>Optional</u>: Up to three letters of support as evidence of partnership or collaboration with partners such as community-based organizations, non-profit service providers, health authorities and public health units, local First Nations and/or Indigenous organizations.

Submission of Applications

Applications should be submitted as Word, Excel or PDF files. Total file size for email attachments cannot exceed 20 MB.

Review of Applications

UBCM will perform a preliminary review of all applications to ensure the required application contents have been submitted and to ensure that eligibility criteria have been met.

Following this, an Evaluation Committee will assess and score all eligible applications. Higher scores will be given to applications that:

- Are submitted by applicants that were not funded in the 2021 intake;
- Demonstrate greater alignment with the intent of the Strengthening Communities' Services program (i.e. address multiple program outcomes);
- Provide evidence of need in the community (e.g. existing homelessness plans, strategies or initiatives; unsheltered homeless population estimates; community concerns about safety) and provide a rationale for how these issues have been exacerbated by COVID-19;
- Demonstrate partnership and engagement with Indigenous leadership, organizations, and communities;
- Demonstrate a plan for communicating and engaging with unsheltered homeless populations to include perspectives of people with lived experience;
- Apply an anti-stigma lens and increase public awareness and understanding of causes and responses to homelessness;
- Include proposed activities and costs that are part of a comprehensive, multi-faceted approach to addressing unsheltered homelessness;
- Include collaboration with distinct needs-serving organizations, public health, health authorities, non-profit organizations, other local governments, police, bylaw enforcement, etc.;
- Demonstrate cost-effectiveness; and
- Demonstrate a plan for winding up and concluding the funded activities (or continuing with alternative sources of funding).

Point values and weighting will be established within each of these scoring criteria. Only those applications that meet a minimum threshold point value will be considered for funding.

The Evaluation Committee will consider the population and provincial, regional, and urban/rural distribution of proposed projects. Recommendations will be made on a provincial priority basis. All funding decisions will be made by UBCM.

All application materials will be shared with the Province of BC.

8. Grant Management & Applicant Responsibilities

Grants are awarded to eligible applicants only and, as such, the applicant is responsible for completion of the project as approved and for meeting reporting requirements.

Applicants are also responsible for proper fiscal management, including maintaining acceptable accounting records for the project. UBCM reserves the right to audit these records.

Notice of Funding Decision & Payments

All applicants will receive written notice of funding decisions. Approved applicants will receive an Approval Agreement, which will include the terms and conditions of any grant that is awarded, and that is required to be signed and returned to UBCM.

Grants are awarded in two payments: 50% at the approval of the project and when the signed Approval Agreement has been returned to UBCM and 50% when the project is complete and UBCM has received and approved the required final report and a financial summary.

Please note that in cases where revisions are required to an application, or an application has been approved in principle only, the applicant has 30 days from the date of the written notice of the status of the application to complete the application requirements. Applications that are not completed within 30 days may be closed.

Progress Payments

To request a progress payment, approved applicants are required to submit:

- Description of activities completed to date;
- Description of funds expended to date; and
- Written rationale for receiving a progress payment.

Changes to Approved Projects

Approved grants are specific to the project as identified in the application, and grant funds are not transferable to other projects. Approval from UBCM will be required for any significant variation from the approved project.

To propose changes to an approved project, applicants are required to submit:

- Amended application package, including updated, signed Application Form, updated budget, and an updated Council, Board, Treaty First Nation or Local Trust Committee resolution(s); and
- Written rationale for proposed changes to activities and/or expenditures.

Applicants are responsible for any costs above the approved grant unless a revised application is submitted and approved prior to work being undertaken.

Extensions to Project End Date

All approved activities are required to be completed within the time frame identified in the approval agreement and all extensions beyond this date must be requested in writing and be approved by UBCM. Extensions will not exceed one year.

9. Final Report Requirements & Process

Final reports are required to be submitted within 30 days of completion of the project. Applicants are required to submit an electronic copy of the complete final report, including the following:

- Completed Final Report Form with all required attachments;
- Detailed financial summary that indicates the actual expenditures from the Strengthening Communities' Services program funding and other sources (if applicable) and that aligns with the actual activities outlined in the Final Report Form;
- Copies of any materials that were produced with grant funding; and
- Optional: any photos or media related to the funded project.

Please note, as a requirement of funding, the program and approved projects may be subject to a compliance audit.

Final reports should be submitted as Word, Excel or PDF files. Total file size for email attachments cannot exceed 20 MB.
